

Holland-days...

On Sunday we were treated to a fabulous feast in the Fellowship Hall. Sally Broughton and her crew put out a tremendous spread as a part of our annual Harvest Dinner. There was also some great entertainment as we dined, which preceded the other reason for our gathering, Pastor Appreciation Sunday.

During the festivities I remarked how Jody McDevitt had utilized a teaching moment for all of us during the previous Sunday's children's message. She was talking about shepherds when a precocious young boy informed Jody she was not a shepherd, rather she was a pastor. Jody seamlessly pointed out to the boy as well as all in attendance that the word pastor is derived from the Latin word for shepherd.

If you google the Latin word for shepherd you will find the verb *pascere* means to lead to pasture, or set to grazing, or cause to eat. These are all functions of a shepherd's vocation. I mean that in both the literal and figurative sense, because when Jesus repeatedly instructed Peter to, "feed my sheep," he was talking about us, Jesus' flock. And so our pastors carry on this rich tradition by leading us to God's green pasture, setting us to graze upon the word of God, and feeding our souls.

It is only natural for us, the flock, to show our appreciation for our wonderful pastors during the third week of November. We are entering a time of year when we clothe ourselves with an attitude of thanksgiving. We experience, as Dan Krebill mentioned in his sermon three weeks ago, the light and buoyancy of gratitude.

My problem is that I don't allow this experience to last. Despite being keenly aware of the many blessing bestowed upon me, I rarely take the time to acknowledge them — much less demonstrate my gratitude for them. Oh sure, I will sit at the table on Thursday and gratefully express my thanksgiving, but if it is like years past, then by the end of the day I will have both literally and figuratively lost that life-affirming light and buoyancy. Unless, of course, I choose to be different.

And that's what it boils down to, isn't it? A choice. I can continue to be a dour-puss, or I can float upon the illuminating petals of gratitude.

I will leave you with a benediction from yet another pastor we are blessed to have in our midst. Paul Krebill in his Words for Thinking and Thoughts for Meditation tells us, "Once you begin to count your blessings you realize the extent to which the richest dimensions of your life have to do with other people."
