Co-Pastors' Corner... How did it happen so quickly that December is here? With

dustings of snow and the Christmas "spiders" hanging on Main Street, there's no question that this special season has arrived, a season of memories and hopes, traditions and new beginnings. Happy Advent to all.

In the most recent issue of *Presbyterians Today*, the magazine's interim editor, Sue Washburn, has written daily devotional reflections for Advent on the theme, "A Journey of Memories." Memory is heightened by this season, when we feel high expectations and intense emotions. Some of our memories are good, and some not so good. Some touch the core of our faith, such as a memory of the first time we felt awe at God's gift of Christ. Some reach the places in our hearts where we experienced disappointment or grief. Christmas memories are strong—just ask a child. Christmas memories are long-lasting—just ask an elder.

What are your memories of Advent and Christmas? For most people, the answer begins with our experiences of family. We recall special meals, stories told and retold, gifts given and received, time spent together. We may also recall frantic shopping, parties with excessive drinking, tension which erupted in fighting, and bills to be paid after the event—memories which stir more regret than joy. As this season begins, remember that you are making memories for the future, for yourself and for others around you. Choose ways of observing the season which reflect its message of love and peace.

As a church, we come together in this season to share the memory of Christian tradition, the stories of our faith, hope, and love. We're making memories together. We're teaching our children that Christmas is so much more than Santa Claus, we're showing families that they have a church family around them to love and support them, we're wrapping our arms around those who feel alone, and we're welcoming strangers into our midst because we remember that Christ came as a stranger into a world which could be hostile and needed to know of God's love. Together, we are living our way into the future God holds before us, fueled by memories of God's promises.

You are invited to all the memory-making times described in this newsletter. Invite someone else to join in, too.



Mt. Ellis Academy Sings in Worship December 11



The focus is on the birth stories of Jesus as we find them in the gospels of Luke and Matthew. Each week we'll address one of these



questions. 1. Where was the manger and what was the inn? 2. Three surprises: his ancestors, Joseph and Herod. 3. Salvation and the wise men. 4. Herod's atrocities and Simeon's welcome. Dr. Bailey brings fresh answers to these and other questions regarding the Christmas story. Join us as we gain some new insight on this old and cherished story. The class meets in the church library on Sunday mornings from 9:30 to 10:15. *Please note that there will be no adult Sunday school class on December 25 or January 1.*

Holland-days...

Our family spent the Thanksgiving holiday in, of all places, Las Vegas, NV. That's right, Sin City. Our youngest daughter moved there about a year ago. She wanted to work and live in a warmer climate and Las Vegas certainly has that — except it wasn't very warm last weekend. Oh, it was pleasant enough, but it wasn't really shorts and t-shirt weather. Perhaps it didn't seem as warm, because it hasn't been very cold here yet.

We've had an exceptionally mild November. The snow pack is off to a miserable start and there is hardly any ice on the lakes and ponds. Oh sure, winter will be here soon enough, perhaps even by the time you read this, but in the meantime it is sometimes hard to get into the spirit of the season when the season doesn't cooperate.

I've never been to the Middle East, but I envision its climate and topography to be somewhat similar to Las Vegas — or at least like the place we had a picnic at on Friday. That was when we loaded a bunch of turkey sandwiches into the car and headed for the hills. The Red Rocks Canyon area is just past the outskirts of town and leads up into the mountains that surround the valley in which Las Vegas is located. Unlike the valley floor, there is vegetation in the hills: short grass, scrub oak, lots of different cacti, and thick brush. There was enough growth that it might even be able to sustain a flock of sheep. So as I enjoyed our picnic, I was reminded of the birthplace of a famous shepherd.

I looked up the average rainfall in Bethlehem. It gets almost five times more precipitation than Las Vegas does. I guess that might prove why there aren't any famous shepherds from Las Vegas. But during the winter both places get just as cold at night — cold enough that an expectant visitor might just be desperate enough to spend the night in a livestock barn.

As we drove back into town from the hills, the dominating view is the outline of the casinos along the strip, Sin City, but my thoughts were on a village a half a world away, where we were saved from our sins.
