C0-Pastors' Corner...Did you know that people who ARE curious learn more than

people who are not? And that people learn more WHEN they are curious than when they are not? These may seem like statements of the obvious, but educational researchers have proven these to be true. Furthermore, while children are naturally curious, too often our educational system, including our Christian educational system, tends to reward compliance more than curiosity. How might we do a better job of cultivating curious Christians?

This was the topic of one of the workshops I (Jody) attended at the annual Association of Presbyterian Church Educators (APCE) conference recently. The presenter, a professor of Christian Education from Union Presbyterian Seminary in VA, described educational strategies with more unscripted time, pretend play, self-directed learning, and experimentation. Situations which provide novelty and complexity generate curiosity. Wow, I thought. This is what we are doing at Rockhaven. Similarly, our Spark Sunday School curriculum has freed teachers to be less focused on conveying specific content and more able to create a curiosity-cultivating learning environment. A conversation with the professor after the workshop reinforced my conclusions. We are moving in the right direction!

In another session, I was on the other side of the microphone. With 35 eager learners, I shared "Community Interfaith Education," a how-to workshop based on the interfaith forums we've held in Bozeman for 8+ years. Already I've heard from the PCUSA's Committee on Ecumenical and Interfaith Relations, asking for this story to be told more widely. What we are doing can be copied and adapted to fit the contexts of communities across the country, and we can build peace right where we live.

Another workshop focused on the upcoming year's Horizons Bible Study, which our Presbyterian Women (PW) circles will undertake. A study of the book of Hebrews, it will focus on community. The writer of the study told us about a research project in which people were taken on a mountain hike. Their backpacks were loaded. Some came with friends, some came by themselves. When asked to estimate the steepness of the mountain before them, the estimates of those who were accompanied by friends were consistently lower than the estimates of those who were alone. The researchers' conclusion? Community makes life's challenges easier.

Isn't that the truth? Isn't that why we gather as church, to be the community gathered around Christ? As Christ's community, we have the gifts of learning together, learning about the world together, and learning to lighten one another's loads. Thanks be to God!

Session Notes

Highlights of the meeting include:

- Jody and Dan reported that they and several members of the church (Sally Broughton, Suzanne Bratsky, Maureen Poremba, and Betty Knutson) joined 40 others from Bozeman in a Montana Association of Churches (MAC) lobbying event in Helena with the legislature. MAC is an association of seven denominations and is focused this legislative session on improving housing for paroled prisoners, improving support for teens with a particular emphasis on suicide prevention, welcoming documented immigrants, and abolishing the death penalty. Over 200 people representing churches around the state filled the capitol and were well received by legislators.
- The Leadership Committee unveiled the church's new website. Check it out at <u>www.fpcbozeman.org</u>. The new website is focused on welcoming newcomers to the church and sharing the ministry and mission of the church with those who are not now part of our community. It is also mobile-friendly, meaning that it works well on your smartphone as well.
- The 24 S. Willson Task Force reported that it is now ready to report to Session on its findings. A summary of the listening sessions and survey can be found on page 3. Session asked the task force to present its report at the February 23rd Session meeting.
- 4. Finance Committee reported that expenses exceeded revenues in 2016 by \$5,000. Expenses came in on budget, but revenues fell short of expectations. The cumulative effect of this plus a larger shortfall in 2015 meant a \$21,000 cumulative deficit in the general fund. Finance commit tee proposed to use a portion of an unanticipated additional gift from the estate of Pat Donehoo to erase the two-year deficit, thereby ensuring all reserves are fully funded, and session approved.

24 S. Willson Update

Background: Last year, the Session, in response to an unsolicited offer to buy the 24 South Willson property, asked a small group of experienced church members to explore an option to re-develop the property we own on the northeast corner of Willson and Babcock to help ensure the long-term availability of parking while minimizing our mortgage on the property and the burden of maintaining the 24 S. Willson office complex which sits on part of the property. The group made a proposal to Session which was tabled based on input from the Congregation. Church members wanted to think more broadly about options we might have and to feel rock solid about the value of the property. As a next step, the Session asked a parking lot task force to set up a series of listening sessions early last fall to better understand the will of the Congregation, to survey the congregation and to dig deeper into the various scenarios available to the church.

Listening Sessions: Church members spent time learning about and commenting on the 24 S. Willson property in three structured discussions. Some conclusions based on those discussions:

• **Don't sell for cash:** Most participants believe that we ought not to sell the property for cash though there was a minority view that the cash gain that could be realized from a sale could be used to fund worthy projects, e.g. Rockhaven re-development.

• **Be a good steward:** Most participants felt the property was a gift from God and that we have a responsibility to steward that gift. Several church members felt that the property was a "treasure for future generations" and should not be developed in any way but rather held like money in the bank.

• **Make sure we have parking:** Most church members felt that parking was critical to the church's long term health. A minority felt that we should do more to understand leased parking and downtown parking garage shuttle options.

• **Get more information:** Most participants did not feel clear about the numbers associated with various options. How much will it cost to keep the office building and maintain it? How many parking spots would be guaranteed if we re-develop the property? How much would it cost to raze the building at some time in the future? Members of the parking lot task force offered general answers to these questions but were quick to agree that precise numbers depend on various inter-dependent choices. For example, we could command more rent from the office building if we invested money into fixing it up or, we might have fewer or greater parking spots depending on which development plan we approved.

• We have no business managing an office building: Some church members feel strongly that we should re-develop the property in a way that provides for parking and divests the church of the office building, arguing that the unknowns and hassle associated with maintaining and improving the office building are too much for a largely-volunteer church that is exhausted from fundraising.

• **Finish the deal we started:** Some church members feel strongly that we should work with the developer that came to the church and proposed a plan that would free the church of debt and provide improved parking in exchange for title to the office building. This group felt we negotiated with this developer in good faith and should be true to that process. Others agreed with this group but felt the "deal" that had been negotiated should be re-negotiated in light of escalating property values. Another sub-set believed that an improved deal should not give away easement rates on the parking lot we would retain.

See what options are available: Most church members were in support of seeing what developers might propose to the church, understanding that the current offer should be evaluated in that wider process. This group argued that the market would definitively establish the value of the property and provide the church with choices. This group believes that seeing what developers might offer by way of a mix of parking and re-development does not preclude the church from deciding not to pursue proposals, "staying the course," and continuing to maintain the property.

In summary, a clear majority of those that participated in the listening sessions felt we should not sell the property for cash. A less commanding majority felt we should re-develop the property to provide quality parking options for the church while paying off the mortgage, reducing the hassle of managing an office building -- understanding that such re-development would be negotiated to make sure we are receiving fair value for the property. A minority feels we should hold onto the property and continue to operate the 24 S. Willson office preserving options for the future.

- **Survey:** 112 Church members responded to the survey. Some conclusions based on an analysis of the responses:
- There is a near consensus we ought not to sell the property for cash.
- The congregation was split between the "Stick with the Plan" and the "Go to Market" options. Preference between the two options was softly held, meaning while most church members feel strongly that we ought not to sell the property, if they preferred the "Stick with the Plan" option over the "Go to Market Plan" (or *vice versa*), but not strongly.
- Ninety percent of the church wants parking and this is a strongly held view. The church is split nearly 50-50 on the need to be debt free. Some members feel that indebting the church exposes it to risk and is an inappropriate legacy to leave the next generation of members. Others believe that debt can be an appropriate tool to grow and manage the Church's assets.

Next Steps: The 24 S. Willson Task Force will present its findings to Session on February 23, 2017.

Holland-days...

I have a tendency to frame a lot of my life experiences around goats. I am sure it is an indication I spend far too much time with those lovable creatures, and that has certainly been the case during the past week. Kidding season started last Friday.

I suspect you don't recall the specifics of the weather on Friday. I do. The official low in Belgrade on Friday morning was nine below. It was at the precise moment when the thermometer reached its lowest point that one of our does decided to give birth.

Toni Stark is a first time mom this year. Her name (Iron Man's real life name) comes courtesy of one of the children in our church who visited our place a couple of years ago. When church children trek out here to play with the baby goats, I always ask for name suggestions. The better names stick, and Toni's is a product of that tradition.

Typically first timers go long; they don't kid early. Toni was an exception to this, and she caught me unprepared. I was unprepared in the sense I had not yet moved her into the kidding pen. As a result she gave birth out in the open — when it was nine below. At that temperature time is of the essence, and I was a little late arriving on the scene. Toni had given birth to a boy and a girl. The girl was first. She had a white body with a black head and four black slippers. The boy was next. He was coal black with a small white star on his head. The boy was screaming, but the girl had already started shivering and was quiet. Their long, floppy ears were frozen. In a fit of panic I rushed them into the garage and started the process of warming up their cores. I dipped their ears in warm water to help minimize the frostbite.

I next brought Toni in so I could start getting milk into them, but the kids were unable to stand on their own and nurse. So I hand milked Toni and bottle fed the precious colostrum that is so vital in the first hours after birth. After a while the boy started to get with the program. The girl, though, was struggling. She was going to need a lot of TLC.

Over the course of the next couple days the girl became our project, Christine's especially. She wrapped the doeling in swaddling blankets, patiently fed her, and even slept next to her. Alas it wasn't enough, as on Sunday night that girl lost the will to survive.

It wasn't the first time this has happened to us. When you deal with enough animals for long enough, there are bound to be mishaps. It is the nature of the beast. Still it got me to thinking about the spark of life, the intangible ember burning at the core of creation's furnace. God lit that fire, then stood back and gave us dominion over it.

Sometimes I think I have let God down. I am not nearly vigilant enough as a steward of creation. I compromise at every turn; my footprint is excessive. But as I beat myself up, I go out to the barn to watch that jet-black boy bounce around with a *joie de vivre* and I am reassured. I thank Toni for her gift. I thank God. And soon enough that boy will have some company.
