Mission Team builds relationships

The adult mission team to Dakota Presbyterian Churches on the Ft. Peck Reservation in NE Montana experienced another year of building relationships through service to the churches. Each year the relationships mature, as the churches provide a dinner and opportunity to catch up on the year gone by. We are grateful for the hospitality provided by the Red Eagle Memorial (Ft. Kipp), First Presbyterian (Poplar), Mnisda (Chelsea) and Makaicu (Riverside) Churches.

This year the team served the Red Eagle Memorial Church in Ft. Kipp. This church, like the other Dakota Presbyterian Churches on the reservation, has a cemetery which has not been mapped or documented. Someone searching for an ancestor's grave would need to rely on the memory of church elders. The church asked our team to map and document the cemetery. Doing so honors the families, traditions, and those who have gone before. This is holy work.

The team spent 2½ days in the Ft. Kipp cemetery, collecting data on more than half of the 700-800 graves. Data collection begins with numbering and flagging all the graves in a row. Each grave is then photographed and its details are recorded in words. Some graves are easy to document, with detailed headstones and distinctive memorial markers. On the other end of the spectrum, there are graves which are detectable only by the presence of a river rock, some irises, or a depression in the ground. All graves are documented. When completed, the information will be available in a large notebook at the church, and also in digital form.

Time prevented the completion of the documentation this year, providing an obligation to return next year to finish the work. Accommodations at Ft. Peck Community College are likely to be available at a similar time next year, so if you are interested in joining this team, reserve the end of May-beginning of June and watch for details.

A more complete report will be provided to the congregation in the fall.

Memorials help build treehouse at Rockhaven

This summer a new structure is being built at Rockhaven to help campers and others learn teamwork and grow in confidence. The structure, variously described as a low ropes course, a treehouse, and a play structure, will be south of the Dining Hall in the treed area around the creek. Children, youth, and adults will be able to safely climb, play, and learn in new ways. The treehouse will surely become a favorite feature of the summer camping ministry.

A gift from the Pat Donehoo estate is funding a significant portion of the cost of building the treehouse. Don Frye, Jr., Donna Mandeville, Harry McNeal, and Marian Cook all loved the ministry of our church at Rockhaven, and funds given in their memory which were designated for Rockhaven will also be used for this new structure.

In addition, several living donors have stepped up to fund the treehouse, which will also serve to attract rental groups desiring teambuilding programs. Approximately \$5000 is needed to complete the project. If desired, your gift may be in memory of a loved one, honored on a plaque on the site. 

Holland-days...

I am well aware of the old adage, "God's timing is not our timing," but there are instances when God's timing seems, well, curious. I realize I am at risk of being labeled a heretic, but hear me out.

As you may know, Christine and I hosted a Farm Day for the youth of the church back on May 21st. It was a perfectly lovely day and fun was had by all in attendance (including a couple of much older youth.) The critters were also for the most part compliant and enjoyed the extra attention. The only things missing, though, were any goat kids young enough to bottle feed. We had some young of the year, but they were almost four months old. At that age they more resemble sassy teenagers than babies that are content to sit in your lap and drink from a bottle. And therein lies the rub.

Five days later our main herd doe decided to give birth two weeks premature. She produced a stillborn male and a tiny, tiny female. We've had babies born that small before, but they've not ever survived more than a day or two. This one, though, despite her frailty and delicate features, managed to make it through that critical period. We certainly did our part to help, but since her mother had only one kid to deal with, this precious little doeling had lots of helicopter moms hovering over her.

After the first week our confidence grew in her ability to survive. She became adept at nursing and we were no longer forced to bottle feed her. She started to fill out, and although she is still small by any measure, we don't have to worry about breaking bones when we pick her up. She is also starting to act like a kid. She runs and bounces and even mixes it up a little bit with the others. Fortunately the others all seem to sense how fragile she is, so they treat her with kid gloves.

All of this is well and good, but it is hardly newsworthy and it is certainly not worth calling God's sense of timing into question. There is, however, more to the story. Despite becoming more and more acclimated to the role of being a young goat, this precious creature still wants to cling to humans. Or at least to follow them — everywhere.

The goats and I have a ritual each morning if the weather and my schedule allow for it. I let them loose out into the pasture for an hour of grazing on the lush spring grass (and weeds.) Unfortunately the baby (and at this point that's all we call her is "baby") is too small to navigate through the thick growth. So she gets left behind in my care. I normally have a routine while the goats are in the pasture and baby is right there behind me every step of the way, including when I go into the house (and thus far anyway she has managed to be housebroke.)

At first I thought it was just me that the baby was so attached to, but she will now do the same thing with Christine and even with some guests we've had. And so I have no doubt that had this baby been around when the children from church were out here, she would have been the star attraction.

I don't know if my little conundrum qualifies as great theological debate, but it does provide me with an opportunity to brag about our special little girl. And heck, we don't need an official Farm Day to extend an invitation to anyone that wants to come out and spend time with our sweet baby. But you better hurry; she's likely to turn into a sassy teenager before you know it.
