Co-Pastors' Corner...The principal of my elementary school was a kindly,

well-regarded man. Each year on the last day of school, we could expect his voice to address all the students in the school over the intercom, providing wise advice for the summer. He knew that virtually everyone would spend some time at a pool, lake, or ocean beach, so he always admonished us, "Don't be afraid of the water, but respect it." (Ironically enough, his name was Mr. Poole!)

This summer at Rockhaven we are exploring the theme "The Water of Life." "We" in this case means the children and youth who come to camp as well as those who attend the Sunday evening vespers services. Since the Bible is filled with references to water, this theme is rich. It's also a great summer theme, because on the banks of the Gallatin River, we have much opportunity to reflect on God's provision of living water.

"Don't be afraid of the water. . ." reminds us to enter life with boldness and faith. Indeed, there are good reasons to be cautious around water, as there are around life. But fear is not the right approach. Fear paralyzes and prevents enjoyment or even participation in life. Taking risks is the way of faith. Trusting that God will be there, God will provide, and God will lead us as we accept new challenges in our life is the way of faith. Plunging in, rather than sitting on the sidelines, is the way of faith. As the PC (USA)'s Confession of 1967 says, "Life is a gift to be received with gratitude, and a task to be pursued with courage." Don't be afraid of the water—don't be afraid of life.

"But respect it," reminds us of the awesomeness of the gift of life. Water, and life, can be dangerous. But without water, we are without life. There are risks in each day's efforts and in each day's relationships. A healthy respect for life's fragility makes us stronger. "Fear not, for I am with you."

If you are feeling a need for refreshment in your spirit this summer, join us at Rockhaven on Sunday evenings for physical refreshment (5:30pm potluck) and spiritual refreshment (7 pm vespers). Don't let the summer go by without enjoying the waters of life!

#### The Least of These (Conclusion)

The Elders plan for their proposed mission trip was to drive four hours to the largest town in the region. Really more of a city than a town, with a population approaching 100,000, they reasoned any place that large was bound to have its seedier side, a needier side. Conversations with a sister church in the big city confirmed their suspicions. The mission team planned to stock up on necessities and food to hand out as they went door-to-door sharing the Gospel and offering assistance.

The congregation embraced the plan, and when the scheduled day arrived, a convoy of eleven cars and trucks left the rez carrying its cargo of a dozen excited children and thirty anxious adults, Judith among them. Someone remarked that the last time a convoy this large left the rez was to root for the high school basketball team at the state tournament.

The mission team gathered at the edge of the housing project, a mix of 50's era government tenements and a dilapidated trailer park. Becky Spotted Owl was the Elder in charge of Missions, and she led everyone in prayer. They split into four groups and began to walk from door to door. Some of the doors were slammed in their face, others were opened with apathetic resistance, yet others were opened with arms aching for company and gladly accepting both the spiritual and physical goods they received.

One door in particular touched Judith in a manner in which she was unaccustomed. Previously she had considered God as more of a celebrity, but here in the squalor of a ramshackle apartment building Judith watched as Necia Old Hand, her young, independent native student, bravely approached the fierce looking gangster that answered the door. This was real life, and Judith was about to see God become a part of the tattooed desperation they had encountered.

Necia casually asked the young man if he would like to come to the Reservation and visit her home. She told him she would love to take him for a walk out in the prairie, show him the different grasses growing there, and teach him about the different roots and herbs her own grandmother had taught her about.

Judith noticed tears welling up in the young man's eyes as he confessed his desire to change his hardened ways. Then when Necia reached out and hugged him, tears flowed from everyone's eyes.

God became real for Judith at that moment. And as for Necia, well, if Jesus wasn't looking out through her eyes, Judith didn't know who was.

The bell rang for recess and snapped Judith back to reality. As she walked around the playground observing her charges laughing and cavorting in the bright spring day, she noticed Necia and Justin Two Elk at the edge of the adjacent pasture digging up a plant. Judith walked over to take a closer look.

Necia looked up, "Hey Teach. I'm showing Justin this root we found. My Grandma told me you can use it to cure headaches and night tremors. You know, big medicine."

Judith whistled merrily as she walked back into the classroom from recess. Something was different, she thought while scanning the room. She then noticed that her window no longer had a crack in it.
