Presbytery at First Presbyterian Church November 3 & 4

First Presbyterian Church will be the host church for the fall meeting of the Presbytery of Yellowstone on November 3 & 4, 2017. Planners are calling this a "Mini-Conference," thanks to the workshops and theme of the meeting. Members of First Presbyterian Church are welcome to join the workshops, help with hospitality, and meet Presbyterians from across the presbytery. Why are we calling this a mini-conference? Our theme for the Presbytery is "Equipping and sending the gifted into ministry." The Leadership Cabinet is providing equipping workshops for churches that will help churches be sent into ministry in their communities. Most of the meeting will be focused on providing resources for churches.

Friday night worship will feature some of our workshop leaders and teams as well as the message by Joel, one of the Whitworth Fellows. There will be a plenary session on Saturday morning led by the Whitworth Fellows, some Presby Cats, and Westminster Spires staff. These college folks will share with us their insights from the work they have been doing and how churches can help young adults navigate through their faith as they look to honor and worship God.

You will be able to attend three of four offered workshops. Friday morning, 10:30 am:

- Rob Hagen, from the Presbyterian Foundation will provide a workshop on stewardship. Friday afternoon: (time to be announced)
- John Patterson, Suzanne Bratsky, and others from First Presbyterian Church in Bozeman will present how materials from Stan Ott are being used to enhance the faith life of church members.
- Holly Aloise, Debbie Funke, and team will help us see how music impacts our worship.
- George Goodrich will lead us in understanding what it is to be a disciple.

Holland-days...

Several years ago the General Assembly of the PCUSA voted to change the titles of the leaders of local congregations. As a result of this change pastors are now referred to as Teaching Elders and the members elected to serve on Session are referred to as Ruling Elders.

On the surface the title *Ruling Elder* may seem like a promotion for those folks previously referred to simply as *Elder*, but in this case the word *ruler* was intended to have multiple meanings. Certainly a ruler is someone in a position of authority called upon to make the tough decisions in the life of a congregation. A ruler, though, is also a measuring device, and in this sense it is intended that the faith life and discipleship of these elders should be a measuring stick we congregants attempt to emulate. Lately our Session has been setting a fine example for us to measure up to.

As I am sure you are aware the Session has designated this church year as the *Year of Call*. Many of us are currently enrolled in the *Called to Life* class led by members of Session. I am sure I am not the only one looking forward to learning how to become more intentionally aware of God's call in my life.

During the past couple of weeks the Session has also begun our annual Stewardship campaign. This is not unusual, because churches always tackle stewardship in the fall; it's how they set their budgets for the following calendar year. What is unusual this year, however, is the marriage of Call and Stewardship and the manner in which our Ruling Elders are exposing themselves to champion this campaign.

This notion of exposing one's self was highlighted in Dr. David Henderson's kick-off to our year of call last month. In his sermon Dr. Henderson quoted Parker Palmer's thoughts on *broken wholeness*. It is when we are at our most vulnerable that we can become most in tune with our call which in turn allows us to find our most true, compassionate selves and express our gifts in humility.

During the past two weeks we have heard from the pulpit and read on these pages the vulnerability of four of our Ruling Elders. I suspect future weeks will hold more of the same in store and I look forward to these stories of broken wholeness. It is no easy task to expose your darkest self to others, but that is exactly what our Session is attempting to do. And they are holding themselves up so that we might measure ourselves and follow their lead. Ultimately we are all following Christ's lead, and it is Christ that shines the light into our darkest selves. This light beckons us to follow God's call and truly become what we were intended to be.
