Ash Wednesday Taizé Service February 14, 6:30 pm

What is Ash Wednesday? Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the 40 days of Lent, the season of preparation for the celebration of Easter. On Ash Wednesday we are reminded of our human frailty and need for God.

What is a Taizé Service? In 1940, an ecumenical monastic community was founded in Taizé. France. Over the years, they developed a distinctive contemplative worship style using simple music and prayer. The Taizé Community attracts more than 100.000 pilgrims each year who come to engage in worship, prayer, Bible study, sharing, and ecumenical work. Our service will follow this style.



Where and when will it be? We will hold the service in the church library on Wednesday, February 14, at 6:30 pm. It will begin promptly and conclude in time for choir practice at 7 pm.

Why should I come? The contemplative style of worship is restful and deep, inviting worshipers to dwell in the presence of God. If you long for a time of peace and quiet prayer, you will find it in a Taizé service. If you long for God's will to be known to you, you may experience that in a Taizé service. If you simply long for God, a Taizé service is an opportunity to draw closer to our source.

Do you remember the first time you heard the Lord's Prayer? Most of us not only can't remember when we first heard this prayer, we can't remember when we memorized it--because our memorizing was not a conscious effort; it was simply the process of hearing the words until they were part of our very persons.

Yet most of us don't know much about this prayer, and we're inclined to recite it without thinking. Martin Luther, with his penchant for saying things directly, described the Lord's Prayer as the greatest martyr, "for everybody tor-

tures and abuses it." It is mostly, of course, the abuse of familiarity. Because we say it so often and because its words have the flow of poetry, we are likely to speak it without investment of either mind or heart. Jesus warned, "In your prayers do not go babbling on like the heathen, who imagine that the more they say the more likely they are to be heard" (Matt. 6:7 NEB). It's ironic, isn't it, that the prayer Jesus gave us is probably the most frequent instrument of violation for the warning he gave us.

Beginning on Sunday, February 18, and continuing through March 25, led by pastor Dan Krebill, the adult Sunday school class will undertake a thorough study of the Lord's Prayer. The class meets in the church library from 9:30 to 10:15 on Sunday.

Holland-days...

There are times when I become consumed with regret — when the shoulda, coulda, wouldas overwhelm me. Last week was a for instance.

Long time church member and early service fixture Vern Bandy passed away last Wednesday. His obituary tells the world Vern lost a courageous battle with cancer. It was a battle I did not help him fight, and it is my first regret.

Anyone that has attended the early service and has stuck around for the fellowship time following the service knows where Vern's spot is. He would lean up against the back of the last row of pews in the front section of the sanctuary. It was from this perch he would regale you with stories. He would hold court. Weather? He was as obsessed with it as anyone. Bobcats? He kept track of all the games. Geography? He knew every small town and landmark from Eureka to Alzada, from Plentywood to Wisdom.

Much of Vern's knowledge of the lay of the land came from walking across it with a dowsing rod in his hands. Yep, Vern was a dowser. A celebrated one, too, and that's where his most fascinating stories come from. It's not often you get to talk to someone that has a book written about them, or been featured in a national magazine, but Vern did. And that is my second regret; I didn't stop to listen to him enough.

I'm probably not the only one that gets caught up in their own little world. I race from one self-imposed deadline to the next, rarely taking the time to stop and — smell the roses sounds so cliché — but it does convey the essence of what I often miss.

Vern didn't seem to have that problem. Perhaps it was his infinite patience, no doubt cultivated by his dowsing: spending long, long days in the field, searching. Searching for water, or snake dens, or gravel quarries, or even a buried wallet. But he always seemed to have a sense of what was most important, and to Vern that was his faith and his family.

So I will regret not praying enough for Vern's health, but perhaps I will do a better job the next time I am afforded an opportunity. And I will regret not stopping to listen to more of his stories, but perhaps I will be more attentive to other people God places in my path.

One regret I don't have, though, is having my own signed copy of *Dowser*, *the Vern Bandy Story* by local writer, Lauri Olsen. I will leave you with a quote from her book. "As the head of his family, Vern is the keeper of collective memories. He is — as many grandfathers are — a repository of stories: the link to the past, handing down his wisdom, values, and insight to subsequent generations."
