Co-Pastors' Corner... 2000 years into its story, the Christian church has a heritage from which genera-

tions can learn. 35 years ago, Tom McMakin's mother was leading courses designed to help Christians discover their calling, gifts, and ministry in a loving community. She wrote a book, *Doorways to Christian Growth*, sharing the content of these courses. As our church enters the last two months of our "Year of Call," Jacqueline McMakin's insights provide yet another angle on understanding and discerning our call.

A question she asks is ""What piece of God's vision is mine?" God's vision is huge compared to our limited sight, but the combination of who we are and what we experience helps us each grasp some portion of God's *shalom*, the love and justice which is God's intention for the world. She writes, "Vision is seeing or believing something; call is doing something. Vision is often fairly consistent over long periods, even perhaps for a lifetime, whereas call changes with circumstances. Vision is seeing the big picture; call is the way we can implement the vision in a particular time and place."

Maybe your piece of God's vision is that children and youth will grow up knowing the love of Jesus, and you implement that by welcoming young people in the life of the church, teaching Sunday school, supporting the camping ministry at Rockhaven, and hosting youth events. Maybe your piece of God's vision is reconciliation between groups long estranged, so you volunteer for the mission trip to the Ft. Peck reservation. Maybe your piece of the vision is caring for the homeless poor—you can answer that call through Family Promise. Maybe your piece of the vision can be fulfilled through an existing ministry of the church, or maybe you have a vision and a calling to start a new ministry and invite others to join you.

In this Easter season, when we explore how we are called to new life (April's theme) and called throughout our lives (May's theme), consider the question, "What piece of God's vision is mine?" And then step out in faith to name and answer your particular call.


Kori Robbins began attending youth group at age 13 where she met the first of her two mentors, Mary Davis, Pastor



Adult Mission Team to Ft. Peck Forming

Are you interested in learning more about Montana's Native people? Would you like to build relationships with Presbyterians on the Ft. Peck reservation in northeastern Montana? Do you have a heart for serving others, with others? Then consider joining the adult mission team which will travel to Poplar, Montana, May 29-June 2, 2018 for a fourth year of partnering with Dakota Presbyterians.

This year our work will be focused around the Red Eagle Memorial Cemetery in Ft. Kipp. Last year we began the work of documenting the graves so that family members can find their loved ones and ancestors. We think we can complete this job this year, providing the local church and community with a notebook and digital files detailing the 700+ graves. You don't need to know how to do this yourself—Mary Hektner



and John Sacklin, members of our team, will show you how. Other jobs will likely include mowing and clearing the cemetery. We are always happy to accommodate physical limitations—you can be a photographer, recorder or snack host, depending on your abilities.

Local hosts Patrick and Sudi Pipe always arrange cultural learning opportunities for us. These have included learning about local plants and their healing properties, visiting the tribe's buffalo ranch, meeting a Sun Dance priest, seeing the tipi rings of Sitting Bull and his people, and hearing the legend of a boulder known as the "weeping grandmother."

Evening meals are provided by members of local churches, providing opportunities to build friendships and understanding. Our team spends time together in reflection and worship each day. We stay in the dormitory of Ft. Peck Community College (they do not charge us anything) and prepare our own breakfasts and lunches in the common room. Costs (breakfasts, lunches, and gas) are divided between team members.



From our Camp Director

Recently, at the World Economic Forum in Davos there was a meeting to discuss the importance of play for kids. The "Real Play Coalition" was formed by IKEA, the LEGO Foundation, National Geographic and Unilever, with the goal to: "create a movement that prioritizes the importance of play as not only something that lets kids be kids, but as something that sparks the fire for a child's development and learning."

How is it that we've come to the point that it's an international crisis where kids don't get to play enough and just be kids anymore? How is it that according to a study in the UK that shows that three quarters of kids in the UK spend less time in the outdoors than prison inmates? How is it that prisoners here in a U.S. maximum security prison are guaranteed 2 hours of outdoor time daily, however 1 out of 2 kids worldwide spends less than an hour outside! There is no wonder then that 1 in 5 youth have a serious mental illness, 20% of youth 13-18 live with a mental health condition, 11% have a mood disorder, and suicide is the 3rd leading cause of death in youth 10-24. We then see tragedies involving our youth on the news and we scratch our heads and wonder why.

So as you might have guessed, the World Economic Forum didn't call and ask me to speak about Rockhaven, UnCamp, and how a tiny church operated camping ministry in Montana has stood squarely on the front lines of this movement for a long time; by being open to the nudging of the Holy Spirit and creating a peaceful space for kids to just be kids. Oh well... I'm sure they'll call next time.

Gods will however is certainly being done at Rockhaven in a Simple, Peaceful, **PLAYFUL** and Faithful way.

The Still, Small Voice (Conclusion)

Rosa zipped up her jacket clear to the folds of skin below her chin as a brisk, spring wind buffeted her face. It was chilly but bearable. One of the things Rosa appreciated about being outside during this time of year was though the air always seemed to be moving rapidly, it was clean and fresh.

Recently Rosa had taken to walking along this suburban parkway rather than jogging. She found that walking allowed her greater opportunity for reflection, to better enjoy the scenery, and she figured she already got enough exercise during her visits to the gym.

The snow had for the most part all melted, even though many nights still registered a hard freeze. It was the time of year when each day was noticeably longer than its predecessor, so it was still fairly pleasant in the early evening, especially when the sun peeked out from behind the busy clouds.

Rosa looked up at the ash trees lining the pathway and the taller cottonwoods behind them along the creek that occasionally intersected the path. They were still dormant, not yet fooled into exposing their green buds yearning to be unfurled. She lowered her eyesight to ground level, here and there a fresh tendril, but by and large the grass, too, was still hibernating.

She began to replay some of the day's events in her mind. She recalled her appointment with the Crowleys. They were late again — some things you just can't change. But Rosa felt she'd been making real progress with them. She'd even asked them to bring their five year old daughter. Normally Rosa didn't like to involve the children in these joint sessions, but the way they both talked about Angela, Rosa figured she might be able to make even greater inroads. Besides after teaching Sunday school for a couple of months and working further on her new pet project, Rosa had thought it was time for the rubber to meet the road.

Rosa wouldn't label the session an unqualified success, but it wasn't a disaster, either. Angela had been precocious and insightful. She'd even provided Rosa with fodder for future sessions. More than anything, Angela had provided Rosa with hope. Hope that the Crowleys were headed toward reconciliation. Hope that Rosa's project could be developed into a tool to help other Crowleys. And hope that this new path Rosa was walking in her life would be as fulfilling as it seemed.
