

Adult Mission Team to Ft. Peck

Are you interested in learning more about Montana's Native people? Would you like to build relationships with Presbyterians on the Ft. Peck reservation in northeastern Montana? Do you have a heart for serving others, with others? Then consider joining the adult mission team which will travel to Poplar, Montana, May 29-June 2, 2018 for a fourth year of partnering with Dakota Presbyterians.



This year our work will be focused around the Red Eagle Memorial Cemetery in Ft. Kipp. Last year we began the work of documenting the graves so that family members can find their loved ones and ancestors. We think we can complete this job this year, providing the local church and community with a notebook and digital files detailing the 700+ graves. You don't need to know how to do this yourself—Mary Hektner and John Sacklin, members of our team, will show you how. Other jobs will likely include mowing and clearing the cemetery. We are always happy to accommodate physical limitations—you can be a photographer, recorder or snack host, depending on your abilities.

Local hosts Patrick and Sudi Pipe always arrange cultural learning opportunities for us. These have included learning about local plants and their healing properties, visiting the tribe's buffalo ranch, meeting a Sun Dance priest, seeing the tipi rings of Sitting Bull and his people, and hearing the legend of a boulder known as the "weeping grandmother."

Evening meals are provided by members of local churches, providing opportunities to build friendships and understanding. Our team spends time together in reflection and worship each day. We stay in the dormitory of Ft. Peck Community College (they do not charge us anything) and prepare our own breakfasts and lunches in the common room. Costs (breakfasts, lunches, and gas) are divided between team members.

Anyone who regularly wastes time by reading the words appearing in this space knows at least a couple of things about me. One is that I am an accountant currently engaged in the busiest portion of an accountant's year, tax season. The other is that I raise goats. I shot her full of all kinds of meds, but two days later she, too, was gone. We were now the proud owners of two orphans. Two ravenous, clueless orphans. During tax season. Oh, and it snows every other day. What could possibly go wrong?

As it turns out, nothing has gone wrong thus far (well, besides the first part of the story.) Those two little bundles of joy are thriving. Three times a day, for as long as it takes them to drink ten ounces of milk replacer (which isn't very long), I am their world. Sure, they are demanding and loud — really loud — but there is a momentary joy while all my other distractions are set aside and I spend a couple of minutes with two of God's more hilarious creatures.

On Monday the sun was out during their evening feeding, so I decided to feed them outside rather than in the shed. I could feel the warmth gathering in my bones. I could feel the pasture getting ready to explode with new growth. And I knew it wouldn't be too long before these two orphans would be bounding uninhibited through the green grass. And I'll be right there, skipping along beside them.
