Co-Pastors' Corner... May is that month when our thoughts turn to transitions

and changes. Even in Montana after a winter for the record books, the tenacity of spring flowers inspires hope in us that there is indeed a summer to come. May is the beginning of transitions marked by graduations—first in the university and then a few weeks later in high school. The completion of a course of study is both an end as well as a beginning—a theme that will be included in countless graduation speeches and charges across the country.

In the church, it is no coincidence that Easter is celebrated in the springtime when new life is emerging all around, and that 50 days later, Pentecost is then observed. Both of these Christian holidays are all about transition and change. Easter is when the course of history was fundamentally changed with Jesus' triumph over the power of sin and death. While Easter is all about the new life that is given to us in the here and now and in the hereafter, Pentecost is about equipping us for that living.

With the coming of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost, the followers of Jesus who had become believers in the risen Jesus, but who were not quite sure what to do with this good news, became ardent proclaimers and evangelists with passion and fire in their bellies for sharing this good news with the world (see Acts chapter 2). It is from Pentecost that these followers, in a sense, graduated from several years of preparation to assume this calling.

This year on Pentecost Sunday, we will be celebrating the culmination of our *Year of Call* in our church. It will be a wonderful opportunity to cap off all of the many ways that we have focused on this important aspect of our Christian character. It will also be the beginning of taking all that we have been considering and incorporating it into our lives going forward. To that end, our services on May 20 will include a commissioning of everyone present to carry out Christ's mission in the world in ways old and new. We hope that you can be there for this special event.

Session Notes April 26

The Session and Board of Deacons met 4/26/18 for our annual joint dinner meeting. Discussion included how we might develop a ministry of serving communion to shut-ins, how we might encourage and provide education for various ministry leaders, and several of the many 'Sailboat Church' programs and ministries already in the church.

The Session then met for its monthly meeting, opening with a Word-Share-Prayer time based on the 'eye-opening' video *People Eyes*. <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=1AbT1IT7Bu8</u>

- Kori Robbins attended the meeting and the Session endorsed her upcoming participation in the YAV (Young Adult Volunteer) PCUSA program in New York City. After approving her solicitation for support funding from members of the congregation, Session voted to help support her with a \$500 contribution from the Endowment Fund.
- Dan Krebill announced the Presby Cats March 2019 mission trip to Baton Rouge, LA to help with post-flooding rebuilding efforts there.
- Church security: Tom McMakin is organizing a group in the congregation who will be trained to respond to basic medical and security issues that may arise. All are reminded **not** to leave car keys or purses unattended when in the church.
- Session Retreat 5/20/18 at Rockhaven. Staff member reviews are being completed. Session approved the upcoming
 ordination and installation of newly elected Elders and Deacons
- Charlie Mandeville, for the Mission Committee, reported on the recent successful Maundy Thursday Agape Dinner with
 plans to hold it again next year. Through generous giving, \$1700 was raised for the One Great Hour of Sharing. The
 upcoming Pentecost Offering will help support programs like the Young Adult Volunteer program and our 40% of the
 offering goes to fund Rockhaven Scholarships. It's anticipated about a dozen church members will participate in the
 upcoming mission trip to the Fort Peck Reservation. There's a continued focus, as well, on Food Bank giving and the Love
 INC toilet paper donations.
- Our "Year of Call" continues with special plans for Pentecost Sunday
- Rockhaven registrations are already >74% and Jody has interviewed parents requesting scholarship assistance so far for 38 children for \$3025. Thanks to all who have contributed to the Scholarship Fund! A complete camp staff has been hired. Session voted to accept Madelyn Montgomery's nomination to the Rockhaven Operational Board. There was a great turnout for the Easter Sunrise Service and anticipated for the Work Day 4/28. Through generous donations, a golf cart and tipi are being purchased and several projects planned at Rockhaven this spring/summer while long range planning, to include a new multipurpose building, continues.

Wear Red!

Pentecost Sunday is May 20 this year, and we are inviting everyone to WEAR RED!

May 20 will also be our Celebration of Call Sunday, the conclusion of our Year of Call emphasis. On that day, both services will include celebratory music. At the 10:30 service, we will also ordain and install elders and deacons, and commission the entire congregation for ministry. It will also be the concluding Sunday of the Sunday school year, so Bibles will be given to graduating 3rd, 8th, and 12 grade students.

Why red? On Pentecost we remember the "tongues of fire" which descended on the disciples gathered in Jerusalem, a sign of the Holy Spirit. Red recalls the fire and is a symbol of the Holy Spirit. We will see red banners and paraments decorating the sanctuary, but the Holy Spirit rests on people, not buildings, so wearing red shows that we are Christ's Spirit-filled people!





It's Birthday Time!

Yes, it's time to celebrate the birth of the Christian Church again! Can you imagine the celebration that took place that first year? And we are still celebrating over 2000 years later. Pentecost Sunday is May 20 and we will be receiving the Pentecost offering at that time. These are life changing years for our young people as they serve as missionaries for our church. **25%** goes to Youth Ministries such as the Youth Triennnium and other leadership development workshops and opportunities. The final **10%** goes to child advocacy that helps nurture children and youth in mind, body and spirit. Since this is a birthday offering, consider giving a dime, quarter or dollar for each year that your have been able to celebrate your birthday and your walk in the Lord or take a box for blessings and during the next few weeks, add a coin for blessings you have received.

Holland-days...

Last Saturday was Clean-up Day at Rockhaven. A good group of folks showed up, rolled up their sleeves and were able to cross quite a few items off the to-do list. One of those items was clearing out additional space amongst the trees on the undeveloped east side of the river. Now it may seem odd to suggest that the forest has too many trees, but in this particular section the junipers had grown so intertwined that it had become difficult — no, impossible — to walk between them. This overgrowth had also created an obstacle to young campers making full use of the potential of this area. So a number of us put a number of tools to work and created what a decorator might call better flow

The tool I was tasked with utilizing was a chain saw. It had been quite a long time since I used a chain saw as much as I used it on Saturday, roughly forty years. I spent one summer in college working for the Forest Service over on the Big Hole and my task (along with several other folks) was to thin a section of the forest that had been clear cut about twenty years prior. The predominate species of tree in this area is Lodgepole pine and they had regrown in this clear cut as thick as, well, the hair on a dog's back. So each day we hiked up from the end of the road carrying a chainsaw on our shoulders and wearing ballistic nylon chaps for protection. We would then proceed to wield that saw all day long. Each person would spread out across the mountainside and select the healthiest looking tree within a twenty foot diameter then cut down everything else within that circle. At that time the trees were all about eight feet tall and to properly fell a tree we would slash the branches off two sides and then cut the trunk as close to the ground as safety would allow. All day long the routine was the same, lift the saw up one side of the tree as high as you could lift it then back down the other side before making a horizontal cut at the base.

It was grueling work and I was plumb wore out by the end of the day. Gradually, though, I got used to it. My muscles developed; I got stronger. By the end of the summer I was probably in the best shape of my life.

Before this past Saturday it had been quite a while since I thought much about that job. The actual task I performed at Rockhaven certainly reminded me of that long ago job, and so, too, did the ache I felt in my muscles the next day. Equally reminiscent, though, was the closeness I felt to God's creation. I was transported back to the high country all those years ago and to my favorite part of the day, lunchtime. That's when the obnoxious whine of the chainsaws would be quieted and we would sprawl out on the grass peering down at the valley way below us. Occasionally a hawk would circle above us or an elk would bugle in the distance. Towards the horizon one could see only mountains upon mountains and trees upon trees.

I've never returned to that old clear cut. Perhaps I will someday to see how vibrant those trees are. In the meantime I know I will return to Rockhaven and now I will keep an eye out to see what exciting things the campers are up to in their newly accessible portion of God's creation.
