John Patterson goes to St. Louis for General Assembly When the 223<sup>rd</sup> General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) convenes in St. Louis on June 16, John Patterson will take his seat in the convention center as Ruling Elder Commissioner for Yellowstone Presbytery. Along with Teaching Elder Commissioner Dick Davis and Young Adult Advisory Delegate Tamara Lucht, also representing Yellowstone Presbytery, and several hundred others from across the country, John will vote on more than 500 items, helping to set policy and direction for our denomination for the coming 2 years and more.

John has been a member of First Presbyterian Church since 1979. Now retired from a career as a family practice physician, John is a member of the Session and the moderator of the Rockhaven Operational Board. He sings in the choir, volunteers with Love INC, and is often the first person to welcome visitors to our church. Sometimes Presbyterians talk about General Assembly as "they," but when a commissioner is as active in a congregation as John is, we are reminded that General Assembly is "us."

#### Church member Kori Robbins to serve as Young Adult Volunteer

One of the founding members of our Presby Cats collegiate ministry has accepted a call to serve as a Young Adult Volunteer beginning in August. Church member Kori Robbins will be serving in New York City. As part this Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) program, Kori is required to raise at least \$4,000 toward the overall \$22,000 that is the cost of her year. The session has already designated \$500 from mission funds in our spendable endowment account to support her. The session also authorized Kori to request financial support from the congregation. Kori has written more about it here.

My name is Kori Robbins, and I grew up in the small community of Anaconda, in the southwest corner of Montana. I earned my Bachelor of Arts in History at Montana State University in 2015, and as of 2017, have been working towards my Masters in American Studies. I am a founding member of the Presby Cats. It's been one of the best groups I could have been a part of during my collegiate years, and I've been even luckier to be a part of it even after graduation. Each day I get to spend with the Presby Cats, regardless of what we are doing, strengthens my faith.



The other group I joined in college that has helped make me who I am is my sorority, Alpha Gamma Delta. God definitely opened this new door for me, and I dove in, maybe not head first, but definitely with some enthusiasm. During my collegiate years, I was able to make some amazing friendships, with sisters I'll never forget. Alpha Gam has given me a sense of purpose, and indeed, along with my faith, our Purpose is what guides my life, along with my faith.

My faith hasn't always been as strong, and each day sometimes feels like a new hill to climb. I wasn't raised in faith, but always had some vague idea that God existed. It wasn't until I was thirteen and invited to Youth Group at the First Presbyterian Church of Anaconda by a friend of mine, that I really started understanding what God meant to me. I wholly credit Mary Davis, then the pastor at FPC – Anaconda for helping make me into the person I am today. I definitely wouldn't be where I am today without her quiet, confident leadership, and kindness for the dorky, weird girl who read too much and asked too many questions. While my faith journey continues, and will always be in a state of progress, I'm proud to say that I was baptized on Easter morning 2018 at my favorite place in the world, Rockhaven, by another favorite person of mine, Dan Krebill, co-pastor of FPC – Bozeman. Dan has been a constant rock in my life, and somebody who challenges and encourages me to be the best person I can be.

In August, I will be moving to New York City to pursue a year of service as a Young Adult Volunteer with PC(USA). I'm trading in my mountains for skyscrapers and wide-open spaces for the concrete jungle. I'm looking forward to serving in a community different from my own!

It costs about \$22,000 to support a YAV during their year of service. Each YAV is asked to raise a portion of that amount; this year it is \$4,000. This money goes towards housing, transportation and other costs.

This YAV year isn't just about me. It's about making connections, and creating a community of people who share experiences and help each other grow. It's about creating a support network who will walk with me during this year. I am asking each and every one of my friends, family and faith community to support me during my year. #### First Annual Faith, Science & Climate Action Conference in Bozeman, October 12 and 13



The Montana Faith and Environment Coalition (MFEC) announced today that they will be hosting the first annual Faith, Science & Climate Action

Conference in Bozeman, October 12 and 13, 2018. The conference is to facilitate discussion between Montana faith leaders and scientists to address climate change. The conference will provide tools and resources for attendees to enlist engagement and involvement for more effective climate action. There will be

nationally-recognized speakers from both the science and faith communities. Topics will include discussion of such key issues of how both communities can engage in mutually constructive discussions to more effectively change hearts and minds and studies from scientists on the changes already evident in Montana. "It's about getting everyone together to discuss facts and finding ways to make the focus on helping our planet," shared Connie Campbell-Pearson, one of the organizers of the event. Speakers will include The Rev. Canon Sally Bingham, one of the first faith leaders to recognize action around changing climate as a moral imperative; Dr. Katharine Hayhoe, an evangelical Christian and accomplished atmospheric scientist who directs the Climate Science Center at Texas Tech; and Dr. Bruce Maxwell, co-director of the Institute on Ecosystems at Montana State University.

Faith, Science & Climate Action Conference 2018 will be held at the Emerson Center in Bozeman, on October 12, Friday afternoon and evening, and will include dinner, and all day Saturday, October 13, which will include breakfast and lunch.
