Co-Pastors' Corner...

One day, in the middle of Jesus' ministry, after he and his disciples had been through a particularly busy time, Jesus said to his disciples, "Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest awhile." (Mk. 6:31)



It is the sentiment in this verse that is part of the reason why Presbyterian pastors are provided 2 weeks of study leave each year, in addition to vacation time. Study leave is that opportunity to go away to a deserted place and find some time and space for rest and renewal. As your pastors, we are very grateful for this benefit that we receive each year.

This year, we recently spent a week of our study leave in New Mexico at a Presbyterian conference center called Ghost Ranch (www.ghostranch.org). This is the third time that the two of us spent a week there together. It is a stirringly beautiful place that gives definition to Jesus' "deserted

place" phrase. While there, in addition to the courses we took, we took advantage of the opportunity to do some hiking in the area.

The most memorable of those hikes this year, was our hike to Chimney Rock that we took before and during sunrise one morning. Because the afternoon heat had been producing threatening lightning storms that prevented hiking, we decided to beat the heat and go at first light. Every step of that 3½-mile roundtrip hike was sacred as we enjoyed the cool air and delighted in the landscape colors changing as the sun appeared and then began its climb across the clear sky. When we reached the turnaround point overlooking the top of Chimney Rock as well as over the expanse below of the Piedra Lumbre (Spanish, "Shining Rock") land grant, we enjoyed a simple breakfast of granola bars, trail mix and refreshing water. It was a sacred moment in which our souls and spirits were renewed. Thank you, God!

Our hope and prayer for each one of you in our church family, is that rest and renewal are part of your summer as well. There are still a few more weeks of summer ahead, which means there's time yet to come away to a deserted place. As we have heeded Jesus' words, we encourage everyone else to as well.

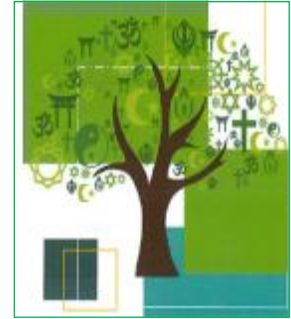

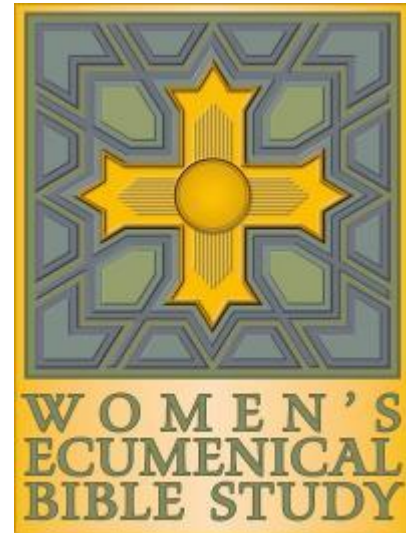

Gallatin Valley Ecumenical Taizé Prayer 2018-2019

Since World War II, Roman Catholic and Protestant Christians, inspired by the [Taizé Community](https://www.taize.fr/en) (<https://www.taize.fr/en>) in France, have come together around the world for ecumenical worship and fellowship. In this spirit, a community of churches in the Gallatin Valley gather amidst quiet, icons, and candles – to pray, read Scripture and sing for about 50 minutes the second Sunday of each month at 7 PM. The music emphasizes simple phrases, often from Psalms or other passages of Scripture, sung as a chant. This year's host church is **St. James Episcopal Church**, 5 West Olive Street (*on the corner of Olive and Tracy Streets*). At 7:00 PM on the 2nd Monday of the month October – May, *except March*, a different church leads. A calm, life-giving way to begin your week, we invite you to come.

Since last August, a group of scientists and faith leaders from around the state have been developing a plan to bring faith and science together around care for our common home. This fall's planned conference is the first result. National and regional leaders will speak and present practical workshops. Networks will develop. Participants will return to their home communities and congregations with motivation and plans for action.

All of this will be based at the Emerson Center, with breakout workshops happening at local churches (First Presbyterian, Bozeman United Methodist, First Baptist, Grand Avenue Christian, and the Catholic Community Center) Speakers and workshops will be videotaped so these vital presentations can be shared in other places in our state.

The conference's keynote speakers are:

- The Rev. Canon Sally Bingham, Episcopal priest and founder of Interfaith Power and Light
- Dr. Katharine Hayhoe, atmospheric scientist at Texas Tech University, and an evangelical Christian
- Dr. Bruce Maxwell, MSU professor, co-director of the Institute on Ecosystems, and a principal author of the newly released Montana Climate Assessment

Workshops will address climate change impacts on human health, faith-led advocacy, solar infrastructure, food security and social justice, and motivating congregations for action.

Holland-days...

In a sure sign that summer is a fleeting season, this week marks the final session of summer camping at Rockhaven. The week features elementary overnight campers, and their first night was Sunday. Although starting on Sunday night is hectic and chaotic for the hardworking camp staff, I have always appreciated seeing the campers when we convene for the Sunday evening potluck and Vespers. There is a vitality and energy in the air that adds to the Rockhaven experience.

I even knew one of the campers. You may recall Kylie, too, as she conspired with me back in February (along with her younger sister) to give a Minute for Mission during church for Rockhaven. I know Kylie from 4-H and I know her to be a dedicated and conscientious young woman. I also know her to be a hugger, so it was no great surprise when she saw me and immediately ran over and gave me a big hug. Just as suddenly, though, she was gone — off to the make believe world of the tree-fort, whose bounds are defined only by the limits of Kylie’s considerable imagination.

The most recent edition of National Geographic features a story about sleep, or more precisely the lack thereof. Human beings sleep far less than they used to, and this study concludes the greatest contributor to this deficit is the microprocessor and the screens that illuminate its output. We exhibit slavish devotion to social media, and newsfeeds, and on-line gaming, and any other application keeping our heads bowed to our devices. We don’t know how to turn the switch off; we have forgotten how to unplug.

Scott Thrasher has long used the phrase “Disconnect to get connected” to describe the benefits of attending camp at Rockhaven. Kids like Kylie get it. They may not know any of the psychological theory behind it, but they know they feel freer and more connected to God and creation when their devices are left at home and their minds are allowed to wander under the watchful eye of Sheep Rock and the soothing song of the Gallatin River.

I had another brief conversation on Sunday at Rockhaven. Ted William’s daughter, Celinda, brought her father as well as her brother, Loren, down there for the potluck. Celinda was showing her brother the dedication plaque on the tree fort which indicated the construction of the structure was a result of funds received in part from their sister, Melissa Barnes’, memorial. Melissa died tragically one year ago, and this was the first time Loren had seen the tree-fort. He commented how sturdy the structure appeared. Strong enough to hold a child’s imagination.
