

The Peace & Global Witness Offering draws Presbyterians together and provides education and exposure to those who show us how to do this work well. It allows us to create resources for dealing with conflict and nurturing reconciliation, and stand in support of our global sisters and brothers, because the peace of Christ belongs to people everywhere. It has helped support our church partners in Madagascar recover from years of destructive development. Scriptural resources helped congregations, like the one in Old Bergen, New Jersey, find common ground with neighbors of many faiths, bringing their children together to learn from one another and to build a peaceful future. And the whole church joins together, through this Offering, to work for an end to all forms of human trafficking, specifically, the sin of child soldiers. As we work to share Christ's peace with one another, let's share that peace with those beyond our doors. Twenty-five percent of this Offering will go to our mid council, joining with other congregations in our area to

support peacemaking work in our region. The second 25 percent of this Offering stays with our congregation, so that we can commit ourselves to active peacemaking. Our 25% goes to Family Promise and the final 50% goes to support peacemaking efforts throughout the entire world.

During the month of September we are focusing on this offering to be taken on World Communion Sunday on October 7.

Roots of Injustice, Seeds of Change

Are you troubled by the history of relations between the various groups of people who live in our nation? Are you concerned that we have not successfully overcome history to make our country one of liberty and justice for all? On Sunday afternoon, September 23, you will have an opportunity to join others with similar concerns, learning more about the Doctrine of Discovery and working together for reconciliation.



The Rev. Duffy Peet of the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Bozeman will facilitate this workshop, which was developed by

a Quaker meeting in Colorado. Many denominations, including the PC(USA), are emphasizing the need to learn more about the Doctrine of Discovery, the 15th century justification for the European subjugation of non-Christian people. The workshop's goal is to raise our level of knowledge and concern about the impacts of this Doctrine, recognize them in ourselves and in our institutions, and explore actions towards "right relations."

Holland-days...

This past weekend I had an opportunity to play God. I suppose I should start at the beginning — the genesis, if you will.

Last year some friends over in Whitehall mentioned they were starting a commercial pheasant raising operation. It sounded like a lot of hard work, but my friends are industrious folks, so I wished them well and told them to keep me informed of their progress. You see, their conversation had planted a seed with me.

My family has some property and a cabin over on the Big Hole River. We primarily use it for fishing expeditions, but our extended family also includes a number of bird hunters. The only problem is that there aren't many ducks and geese on the Big Hole, and there aren't any pheasants on our section of the river. None. Ever. The conventional wisdom holds that the climate is just too harsh and the altitude too high to sustain a population of ring-necks. But I started to think perhaps climate change would make the habitat a little more adaptable, a tad more suitable.

Then last month my friends called and said their first batch of pheasants were ready to be released. I told them I was interested, but I needed some time to run the idea up the family flag pole. Most of the folks I contacted were dubious, but they said if I wanted to go to all that trouble they wouldn't stop me.

The next step was to contact the Montana FWP. My friends are licensed through FWP and they require any transactions to be approved by FWP. So I filled out all the appropriate paperwork which included providing the coordinates for the release point on the Big Hole. The FWP approved it; I was legal. So on Labor Day I set out to play God.

As you might expect, when humans try to play God things don't always go so well. Since I was the first 'customer' for my friends, none of the logistics had been attempted before. There were issues catching the birds. There were issues caging them. There were issues transporting them. By the time we were done with everything, only three adolescent ring-necked pheasants got released — all of them female.

The most important gender of any species is by far the female, but you do need at least one male in order to propagate the population. I guess we'll have to wait a while for that to happen. Fortunately my friends and I weren't too discouraged by this initial foray. It might take several more years for this experiment to be completed.

The natural world is full of examples of we humans playing God. Bucket biologists have transformed the fish populations in entire water systems by introducing non-native species. Ornamental plants brought over from Europe and Asia comprise some of our most noxious of weeds. Heck, even pheasants aren't native to North America, as they were introduced from China and Korea a little over a century ago.

I'm sure God shakes his head and cringes at some of the endeavors I undertake. This was just the latest one.
