

If you will be bringing children, please call the church office to arrange for a sitter and allow us to provide appropriate movies for the younger set.


Christmas at Rockhaven, Saturday, December 15

Last week, Gallatin Refugee Connections held their 2nd annual drive for the International Rescue Committee and Soft Landing Missoula to collect Welcome Kits that provide new and like-new household supplies and warm clothes for refugees arriving in Missoula.

Bozeman showed up in huge numbers and provided Missoula's refugees with a 20' truck and a 12' trailer FULL TO THE BRIM with over 200 Welcome Kits!!!! We are still in awe and shock at how kind and generous the residents of Bozeman are.





A BIT OF OUR HISTORY HAS COME TO LIFE



Louis Albert Edwin Krneger A LIFE UNCOVERED by Paul Krebill

A little over a hundred years ago, before our church building was completed, a sixtyeight-year old bricklayer came down into the unfinished basement when it had begun to rain. He shook off the rain from his clothing and prepared to wait out the rain before continuing his brick laying on the north wall of the building He climbed a ladder so that he could look out the window facing Babcock street to see when the rain stopped enough for him to resume his brick work. The window was not fully framed yet so that the raw wood around the pane was exposed. He took his carpenter's pencil and signed his name on the inside stripping.

Louis Krueger 1909 Bozeman

It was about a hundred years later when Chuck Beck removed the window framing in the course of his remodeling of the basement. And under the framing he found Louis Krueger's long covered signature! His signature can now seen in a plaque in the fellowship hall on he wall between the Babcock street windows along with our own Chuck Beck's' signature.

In response to this discovery, the Session has suggested that a life story of Louis Krueger be written. With the help of Rita Ng, Krueger's great grand daughter, and others, his life has been written in a booklet entitled "Louis Krueger–A LIFE UNCOVERED" which is available in the back of the sanctuary.



I then realized it has been a while since any five-seven-fives have appeared in this space, so with the advent of Advent upon us I offer a few for your consideration:


Black Friday had deals. Cyber Monday had less stress. Giving Tuesday rocks.
