#### Session Notes December 20

- Charlie Mandeville led the devotion and opened the meeting in prayer.
- The congregation is encouraged to attend the excellent Sunday morning Adult Ed. Classes, which have continuity, though can be attended on an occasional basis.
- The Session Subcommittees on "Learning God's Love" and "Living God's Love" will be meeting in January to continue our church year theme of "Living and Learning God's Love, Together."
- For the next quarter, Holly Aloise will be the "Ombud" to the congregation.
- Deacon Mary Thompson presented a report of the many Board of Deacons activities and potential new church opportunities being considered by the Deacons.
- The Rockhaven Operational Board held a very useful annual Board Retreat on 12/9 facilitated by Elder Kelly Meredith. The "Christmas at Rockhaven" event on 12/15 was well attended and very enjoyable.
- Kris Hall was pleased to note the James & Barbara Breen Charitable Remainder Trust has presented the FPC Endowment Account a gift of \$70,295.
- The "24 S. Willson Task Force" report noted several deficiencies with the current property management company with the Session voting to terminate that contract in 60 days. After further review by the Task Force, a new management company will be considered and rents will likely be raised, anticipating this will provide some income to the church which can be applied to the 2019 budget.
- After further discussion, the Session approved a 2019 balanced budget which includes some additional income, in part from the "24 S. Willson" property. With the Session anticipating that the congregation will be receptive once it understands the current budget situation, Brent Turner and John Patterson will be working with the congregation in January to encourage \$7,212 more in 2019 pledged and unpledged giving to "Fill the Gap" in pledges.

# FIRST FRIDAY - JANUARY 4, 2019 FELLOWSHIP HALL – FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH LILLIES OF THE FIELD

Join us at 5:30 for a spaghetti dinner - movie – popcorn – and ice cream for dessert as we discuss the implications in our lives from a Christian viewpoint of the movie for the month, *LILLIES OF THE FIELD*. The title is based on the Bible verse from the <u>Sermon on the Mount</u>: "Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they toil not, neither do they spin. And yet I say unto you that even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these." It tells the story of an African American itinerant worker who encounters a group of East German nuns, who believe he has been sent to them by God to build them a new chapel for the townsfolk—who are Latino and impoverished—as the nearest church is miles away.



Sidney Poitier won the 1963 Academy Award for Best Actor, the first African-American to win a Best Actor award and the second African-American to win any Oscar. The film was also nominated for Best Actress in a Supporting Role (Lilia Skala), Best Cinematography, Black-and-White, Best Picture and Best Writing, Screenplay Based on Material from Another Medium. The film was also nominated in 1965 for the United Nations Award at the BAFTA Awards

## Have you ever wondered about Per Capita? Your Per Capita at Work from the Yellowstone Currents

It's been called 'dues', a 'head tax', a 'membership fee', and no doubt some words that we shouldn't print in this gentle publication. We in the PCUSA, and more specifically the Presbytery of Yellowstone, call it *per capita* which is a Latin term meaning pay up or you won't get into heaven. Okay, that last part was a lame attempt at ecclesiastical humor. Per capita is actually an assessment levied by the Presbytery based on each congregation's membership at the end of the previous year. Not all of this assessment stays in the Presbytery, as roughly one-quarter of the total amount is passed through to the regional governing body (The Synod of the Rocky Mountains) and the national governing body (the General Assembly.)

So, once the amount of the assessment that stays within the Presbytery is determined, you may be asking, what do those dollars pay for? Well, certainly there is some overhead, as in the lights over the heads of the hard working staff of our Presbytery, whose modest office can be found in the basement of First Presbyterian Church in Bozeman. Most importantly, though, per capita pays for people — five people to be precise — none of whom are full-time employees.

If you have ever called the Presbytery office you have undoubtedly spoken with Susan Seibert, the Administrative Assistant, and if you have ever received an email from YellPres then Susan sent it. She is the engine room in our Presbytery and keeps everything running smoothly.

Sheryl Hallin is our Treasurer and she keeps track of a rather complicated set of books. She pays the bills, processes the payroll, and otherwise keeps our heads above water.

Our Stated Clerk is Jim Tarr, and he is capably assisted by Melissa Perrault-Baumann. It may be the case your only exposure to the Stated Clerk is at Presbytery meetings, however the Clerk's work never ends. They are expected to attend and document every meeting and official ceremony within our boundaries. In addition there is a host of other clerical, administrative, and correspondence related chores that fall under the Clerk's purview. The Stated Clerk's office is the only one required of a Presbytery in the Book of Order.

The last set of people your per capita dollars help pay for is our Co-General Presbyters. George and Kathy Goodrich have split this position (on a 90/10 basis) for the past thirteen years and about four years ago the position was reduced to half-time. Of course this is a laughable description, because they essentially do everything they were doing when working full-time, it's just that now they only get paid half as much. A General Presbyter's duties have been called being a Pastor to the Pastors, but there is much more involved. Much like the Clerk, their presence is expected at all official gatherings, but they must also assume the mantle of executive director and chief of staff. There are also denominational responsibilities in addition to the wear and tear of administering to a Presbytery that stretches from Wisdom to Wolf Point.

In 2018 the cost of employing these people was just shy of \$122,000, while the Presbytery's portion of your per capita payments is only a tad more than half that amount. A decade ago the Synod funded that shortfall, however their support has slowly been dwindling, and starting next year we will not receive any monies from them. Many of you reading this have taken it upon yourselves to help bridge that gap and we are deeply appreciative of your support. In our next column we will look at additional ways you can help finance this vital ministry.

Offering Envelopes are available at the church office during the week. Envelopes are available for weekly and monthly giving along with quarterly Deacons Benevolence Pledge envelopes. Please note that the Per Capita for 2019 is \$54 each member. The Per Capita goes to the Yellowstone Presbytery, Rocky Mountain Synod and the General Assembly help pay for expenses. 
