Feb 13 – Will Wright, "Solar Energy for Church Buildings"

Will is a doctoral student in environmental history at MSU and a member of Resurrection University Catholic Parish's Creation Care Team. With his leadership, Resurrection Parish has received a grant from Northwestern Energy for a solar project to be installed in 2019.

Feb 20 - Dr. Katey Franklin, "Opioid Addiction"

Katey is the program leader for the addiction counseling online post-baccalaureate certificate program at Montana State in the Department of Health and Human Development. She has taught most of the courses in addiction counseling and has worked with students across the state of Montana, especially trying to attract and work with students from Montana's tribal communities.

Feb 27 – Rabbi Ed Stafman, "Eyewitness at the Mexico Border, December 2018"

Rabbi Ed is Rabbi Emeritus of Congregation Beth Shalom, where he served for 10 years. He joined a group of rabbis who traveled to the Mexico side of the border, where they volunteered with a Jesuit (Catholic) mission which serves people who have been deported from the U.S.

Begin the season of Lent with the observance of Ash Wednesday, 6:15 – 6:45 in the church library. Mar 13 – The Rev. Roxanne Klingensmith, "Ministry at the Gallatin County Detention Center"

She knows the people, the programs, the problems, and the positive aspects of our county's corrections system.



Cookie dough varieties are Country Chocolate Chip, Peanut Butter Pleasures, Snickerdoodles, Oatmeal Raisin Chews, Cookie Jar Gingersnaps, Macadamia White Chocolate Lace, Chunky Chocolate Heath, MMM Monster, and Triple Chocolate Chunk. Each 3-pound tub sells for \$17 and makes 48 1 oz. cookies. There are dry baking mixes that sell for \$14, pasta and sauce mixes that are 3 for \$15, and trail mixes for \$16. Lord of everyday,

I know that you cherish the moments when we engage with you in regular conversation, but sometimes we hesitate to do so when we are discussing trivial matters. And perhaps trivial isn't the proper word to use here. What I have in mind is far from trivial, but it does seem like something that would be beneath the dignity of your mighty throne.

Okay Lord, the thing that is bothering me today is the political divide within our country. It is a morass, a chasm, a bottomless pit in which hurtful insults are hurled by each side and echo through this deep ravine for all of eternity — or at least until the next news cycle.

A case in point is the attempts this week to avert the looming government shutdown. Why, we ask you, O God, are there even shutdowns in the first place? And why is there this insistence that someone owns a shutdown? Despite all of the lip service politicians pay to reaching across the aisle, rare is the time when they actually do it. So perhaps you are saying, precious Lord, it is up to us to reach for them. Not until we change our mindset will we elect leaders that will change theirs. Not until we loosen our preconceived notions will politicians loosen theirs. Not until we practice the ministry of reconciliation will our leaders feel the need to join in the same mission.

Oh, King of Kings, change my heart and encourage me to direct all of my conversations to you.
