The first time I heard about the Young Adult Volunteer Program was the spring of 2015, when Pastor Jody McDevitt suggested that I look it up. I thanked her for the information, looked it up briefly on the Internet, but essentially thought that the program was not for me.

Flash forward a few years, and things had changed. Many of my friends had moved on, to graduate school, and other new places, and many of the Presby Cats were in the process of doing the same. I was feeling a little burnt out by my job, and the feeling that everything and everybody in my life was moving forward but I wasn't. I kept thinking, "I'll be happy when...," and "My life will start when..." It took a Presby Cats mission trip to Miami to realize that I needed to make a change in my life instead of waiting around for something new and different to magically appear.

I got home from the 2018 Presby Cat Mission Trip to Miami, and that evening started an application. I left Bozeman in August and have been living in New York since then. I have two work placements: the Presbytery of New York City and the Church of the Living Hope in El Barrio (East Harlem). With the Presbytery, I'm compiling information about domestic and international mission work the Presbyterian churches in the city do. This includes outreach, partnerships, and financial gifts. For the Church of the Living Hope, I do a little bit of everything, but primarily I'm doing community outreach through a variety of different projects. This is how I always thought of mission. It was my job to swoop in and save the day, to fix every problem that every marginalized community had. Only I and (and the groups I was with) could handle it.

However, I don't have the most impressive qualifications. I don't know how to build anything, and I have no upper body strength to speak of. I'm uncomfortable with evangelizing. Of that list I just named, the only things I've got going for me is that I'm a good cook, and I love to travel. Not exactly a picture perfect missionary.

My motto this year has been: Do justice. Love mercy. Walk humbly. (Micah 6:8)

Do Justice.

During my year in New York City, I've been finding my voice, learning to use it when it matters, and stepping back to listen when it's not my turn to speak and share experiences. This year has been about leaning into the discomfort of knowing that I live a life of privilege. Sometimes I can use that privilege to make sure others voices are heard.

Love Mercy.

The greatest part of New York City is its people. There is so much diversity in the streets: different faces, different languages, different abilities. It's a lot to take in sometimes. I've learned that mercy begins by opening yourself up to everyone, and learning that everyone has something to offer. It doesn't end there but those small acts of understanding can lead to life-altering experiences of love.

Walk Humbly.

Walk humbly is something I'm still working on. Not just with God, but with others as well. I'm a pretty smart person, knowledgeable on many topics, but I'm not the smartest. As much as I hate to admit it, I don't know everything. Sometimes, the best thing I can do is close my mouth, open my mind, and listen.

For me, mission this year has been: leaning into the discomfort of being in new places, sometimes where I don't speak the language. Learning that spirituality means something different to everyone. Learning that mission isn't always the large, grand gestures or something I need to post about on Instagram.

Learning that I'm not needed to "fix" anything. Learning that I'm wanted anyway.

Regular readers of the words in this space know that goats are often mentioned here. A good portion of every day of my life for the past fifteen years has centered around these gentle creatures, so it only makes sense they would be featured in observations I make about our common walk through God's kingdom.

One result of this symbiotic relationship (I feed the goats and they provide me with food for thought) is that friends and acquaintances ask me about goats. This isn't really an earth-shattering revelation; after all the friends of a farmer will ask about farming, the friends of a quilter will ask about quilting. It just means I am normally not surprised when someone asks me about my goats. Well, that is until the Sunday before last.

Prior to the beginning of the early worship service on that Sunday one could hear the typical muted conversations floating from among the pews. Included in this was my greeting of a couple I had not seen in church for quite some time. Upon seeing me the woman commented I did not have a goat draped across my shoulders. At first I laughed along with the woman and her astute observation. And then I cried.

Beginning late last summer life has presented a particularly cruel twist for the Dickensheets family, faithful and longtime members of our congregation. Simultaneous with Fritz' diagnosis with cancer, Pat began a rapid descent into the haunting specter of dementia.

It had been several months since I had visited Pat at the memory care facility where she now resides, so I didn't know what to expect when I greeted her in church. My spirits were immediately buoyed when I saw her same easy smile and heard her same easy laugh. And then when she made the goat comment, I knew God's Spirit was very much present.

The Holy Spirit continued to have a powerful presence during the worship service as Jody's sermon, entitled *Love Stirs the Waters*, focused on the uncomfortable topic of Alzheimer's. At its conclusion we sang a hymn I had not previously heard. *When Memory Fades* is a beautiful prayer set to music and the first stanza reads as follows:

When memory fades and recognition falters, when eyes we love grow dim, and minds, confused, speak to our souls of love that never alters; speak to our hearts by pain and fear abused. O God of life and healing peace, empower us with patient courage, by your graced infused.
