Co-Pastors' Corner... Learning and living God's love, together

If you were part of the life of First Presbyterian Church in the past year, you will recognize this phrase as the theme we've been exploring as a statement of our church's vision. It seems to fit us well! Our congregation is committed to God's love, to teaching and learning God's love, and to putting God's love into action together. We can use this statement of our vision as foundation for everything we do.

With our foundation in place, this year we intend to go deeper. What are the dimensions of God's love which can help us make choices, clarify our values, and set goals? How can we grow together in answering God's call?

We'll be diving into three biblical themes this fall. The first is Justice. Our youth will kick off this theme on September 15 by sharing their mission experience in San Diego, "A Place at the Table." Justice in God's realm means justice for all, not for some. The prophets of the Old Testament spoke clearly about this expectation God has for us, and Jesus provided us a way to follow. Justice is an expression of God's love.

The second theme will be Compassion. The root of this word is *passion*, meaning "suffering," and the prefix *com*- means "with." So compassion is "suffering with," and no one was more compassionate than Jesus. Often when we feel compassion, we aren't sure how to act most effectively. Our fear causes us to close off our hearts. Understanding compassion as a dimension of divine love can free us to live it more fully.

The third dimension will be Truth. In a time when people talk about "truthiness," "fake news," and "alternative facts," it's clear that we need to reach agreement on the nature of truth! Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life," and "You shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." Paul talked about the relationship between truth and love in 1 Corinthians 13:6 – "Love does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth." As we examine truth as a Christian value and ideal, we'll learn better how to live truthful lives.

We look forward to having you join us this fall as we learn and live God's love, together.



Parents, please be sure to complete the Sunday school registration form. This helps us keep kids safe!




Family Promise of Gallatin Valley

SSP! SSP! These three letters have become very important to the youth of our church in the last two summers. They stand for Sierra Service Project, the organizing community which sponsors the service "camps" we have joined for our summer mission trips. Come learn more about SSP and its impact on our youth and adult leaders on September 15 at both the 8:30 and 10:30 services. You will be inspired!

Founded in 1975, Sierra Service Project was modeled after Appalachian Service Project. Originally founded by several United Methodist Church ministers, SSP is now an ecumenical non-profit organization. SSP's youth program is centered around youth groups from a variety of churches. SSP believes that young people develop a strong and deep understanding of God's gifts and God's grace through the direct experience of being in service to others. With 5 service sites and 7 summer weeks, over 1500 youth and adult volunteers completed 68 community and home repair projects this summer. Our group was in San Diego this summer.

Our congregation generously supports these opportunities for our youth to grow in faith, hope, and love. Our youth want to say "thank you."

On Monday, August 26, Presbyterian Church (USA) mission coworkers Charles and Melissa Johnson told an FPC audience many inspiring stories of their work over the past 4 years in rural Zambia, as partners with the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian. They will be returning for another 4-year appointment. Charles works developing sustainable agriculture practices which ministry students can take to their parishes when they become pastors. Melissa works with the CCAP in health education projects, especially for women and children. Their gift to our church is a "chitenge," a piece of cloth worn by all women in rural Zambia to preserve their modesty (legs are never exposed), carry their infants on their backs, and on their heads as padding for carrying whatever needs to be carried.


