After her car went flying off the road and rolled, first responders believed Rev. Shelly Wiley was dead. Her new medication kept it under control but law requires anyone having a seizure not drive for six month.

While she struggled to adept, the Presbytery of the

Miami Valley suggest a plan to pay drivers to take her to work related meetings. It involved a shared grant between the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions, the Presbytery and her congregation. The Christmas Joy offering funds this program. Another blessing of this was the time Rev. Wiley was able to spend time with members of her church. One of one time allowed members to explore their faith and one driver discovered a passion of home bound ministry.

## Holland-days...

At the second worship service this past Sunday Co-pastor Dan Krebill led the children's time during which he showed the children the nativity scene or crèche on the table in the back of the sanctuary. Dan also explained to them that Advent is a season of waiting. There were a lot of children in attendance and most of them seemed to be familiar with the different 'characters' in the nativity. I also think all children everywhere are familiar with the notion of waiting, albeit some more anxiously than others.

There are only two weeks remaining until the blessed day we await. One of the time honored ways we facilitate the process of waiting for Christmas is via an Advent calendar or devotional. A daily devotional is always a sound spiritual practice, and it is especially so during special times of year like Lent, or in this case, Advent. Our bulletins this season have included a printout each week from the devotional published in Presbyterian Outlook magazine. Like most daily devotionals there is a scripture passage for each day of the week along with a reflection to ponder and a prayer to pray. I would imagine quite a few people in our congregation are taking advantage of this wonderful resource as they navigate the days leading up to our celebration of our dear savior's birth. I am not one of them.

Instead I am utilizing a daily devotional from a different magazine, Presbyterians Today. It caught my eye last month when I received my edition in the mail, and so I decided its supplement would be my devotional this year. It is written by a minister by the name of Sherry Blackman and features the same formula of scripture, reflection, and prayer. It also highlights as its central theme creating a Matthew 25 season and more specifically adding straw to the manger.

I have to admit I was unfamiliar with the concept of straw for the manger. It is evidently a long held tradition, and it focuses on acts of kindness during the season. These acts are then commemorated by adding a piece of straw to Jesus' manger. This is a lovely, selfless notion which has the added figurative benefit of cushioning Jesus' entrance into a hard, cold world.

Matthew 25 has been a point of emphasis for our denomination during the past year, as the PCUSA has encouraged its congregations to become Matthew 25 churches. Those are churches focused on the missive from Christ found in Matthew's gospel where *I* was hungry and you fed me, *I* was homeless and you sheltered me, *I* was naked and you clothed me...and as you do this for the least of these, you do it for me.

No matter which daily devotional you choose to read this season, I pray it will enrich your experience as we await the birth of the Prince of Peace.
