Congregation Responds to Survey



Ninety persons responded online and 14 were assisted in completing the poll by office administrator Linda Best, for a total of 104 respondents. Many comments were included, which provide food for thought for church leaders going forward. Many thanks to all those who responded.

[10%] YES [90%] NO


Comments: Some expressed concern that masks would not be required.

 YES [76%] NO





[71%] Sunday morning services have been important in my life.


[56%] I have stayed connected to the church family.

[32%] OCCASIONALLY



Town Hall Meeting Answers Congregational Questions

On Wednesday, June 10, a "Town Hall Meeting" provided another opportunity for the congregation to ask questions and for church leadership to gather information regarding reopening the church building. Following is a summary of questions and the responses of Pandemic Response Team members.

Why are we taking so many precautions regarding church?

There are a number of reasons.

- Research reveals three elements (three "Cs") which contribute to the potential for a "superspreader" event: a Crowd, in a Closed room, where people are in Close contact with one another. This sounds a lot like church as we have known it.
- Group singing, a favorite activity in church, projects aerosols, which can include the coronavirus, far and wide.
- At least 25% (maybe as high as 40%) of those who are infected are asymptomatic.
- Our congregation includes many who are considered "vulnerable," meaning that if they are infected, there is a significantly higher likelihood they will need to be hospitalized, and if hospitalized, a significantly higher likelihood of death. We are called by our faith in Jesus Christ to care for "the least of these," who in this pandemic, are those categorized as more vulnerable.

What are the plans for Sunday school, nursery, and the reopening of the church office?

At this time, efforts are being focused on providing one (9:30 am) in-person worship which will take place concurrently with online worship. We have no plans yet for Sunday school, church nursery, or other activities. Phase 2 guidelines encourage businesses to provide for employees to work from home if able, and we are able to continue our essential functions this way, so the office will remain closed until health conditions improve.

How soon will we know when worship is in-person as well as online?

The Worship Team, working with the Pandemic Response Team, has been working very hard to put in place the technology needed for concurrent worship services. We have very smart and very committed people working on this, but this is new territory. That said, the Pandemic Response Team on Monday, June 15, set a target date of Sunday, July 5, 2020 for in-person worship to reopen. We will continually monitor the public health conditions and will confirm this date as it draws closer.

What about Rockhaven Vespers? Can we have outdoor worship there that would be safe for vulnerable persons? It was the decision of the Rockhaven Operational Board that while we are in Phase 2 of Montana's reopening, we will not gather for formal activities at Rockhaven. If Phase 3 is announced, activities such as groups eating outdoors and outdoor worship may be organized.

How are decisions being made? What authorities are being followed?

The Governor's office has determined the plan for reopening Montana. The Gallatin City-County Health Department has authority within that plan to be more restrictive, but not less restrictive. We will follow the directives of both state and local authorities. There is no set number of infections which will trigger our church's decisions. Each church has freedom and responsibility to determine what is best for their congregation.

Will we be required to wear masks during in-person worship?

The Pandemic Response Team is still finalizing the "gracious boundaries" which will define our in-person worship. This question is not yet resolved. At the minimum, masks will be "strongly encouraged" and made available at the door for those who do not bring their own.

Many thanks to those who joined the Town Hall Meeting, listening to the concerns of others and truly, being the church!

Pandemic Report by John Patterson

My thanks to John Sacklin for stepping in for me last Sunday while Judy and I were out of town. In this era of online access to our services we were still able to attend the service and take communion with all of you from our motel room.

The Pandemic Response Team continues to meet twice weekly to review current COVID-19 related guidelines and to work out the final details of protocols and checklists for starting summer camps at Rockhaven June 29th and reopening our church building to in-person services (target date of July 5th) while continuing and improving online access.

Updates from the Team include:

- This was the second week of seeing if we could have part of the worship team in the sanctuary and others, especially those in the more vulnerable categories, at home just as we plan to do when we actually resume in-person services. Despite a few glitches, it seems to be working.
- We've had a technology consultation with a local company and, following their recommendation, new camera equipment is being purchased which will provide good quality video for the long-term for those accessing our services online.
- Thanks to everyone who participated in last week's Congregational Poll. Those results will be available to the Pandemic Response Team this week and will definitely help guide our planning.
- Last Wednesday evening, following the weekly Congregational Zoom Gathering, a 1 hr. Zoom Town Hall meeting was held to discuss and answer questions about our upcoming transition to concurrent church services in-person and online. Thanks to those who were able to join us.
- One of the important steps for us to be able to open to in-person services is to have the help of a
 number of church members, who are not in the 'vulnerable categories,' to be greeters. As a greeter
 you will receive training on how to provide gentle guidance on our 'gracious boundaries' as people enter, are seated and leave the church. If you are available, please contact Linda through the church
 phone system. And, if you are asked to serve as a greeter, please accept, understanding that we can't
 reopen without your help.
- When a decision is made that we are ready and can reopen to in-person services you'll hear about it in communications to the congregation. So, please stay tuned.
- There are some additional updates regarding Rockhaven:
 - * A big THANKS to those who were able to get to Rockhaven on Saturday for the work-day. Scott had a big list of to-do items and we got a lot of them done! Thanks, also, to Jim and Bernie Mitchell for bringing everyone lunch.
 - * Help is needed all summer with weekly mowing and/or weed whacking. Please check the email that went out on Friday and the weekly PresbEnews for a link to 'SignUpGenius' if you would be willing to help one or more times this summer.
 - * Although we won't be having our usual weekly Sunday Potlucks and Vespers this summer, beginning next Sunday, Father's Day, Rockhaven will be available on good weather Sunday afternoons for informal outdoor individual and family picnics and use. This will offer the opportunity for those in the congregation to enjoy Rockhaven and to be together informally outdoors as a church family, while still maintaining appropriate physical distancing.
- As a closing thought, we continue to wish you all good health and encourage you to stay safe and stay connected with each other and with God. This is our prayer for you.



A GA like no other

There is no question, the 2020 General Assembly will be unlike any the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has seen before.

It's being held during a stunning season in American life — the aching time when more than 100,000 Americans have died from COVID-19, when protesters fill the streets night after night to protest racial injustice and the police killing of George Floyd, when churches are trying to live into the new realities of worshipping online, when the world seems to tilt in a new direction almost every hour and who knows what will come next? Fittingly, the new theme of this assembly is "From Lament to Hope" — the implications of which seem to expand day by day.

Virtual GA. This will be the first time a PC(USA) assembly has met virtually — all online, a technological challenge both for organizers and commissioners, something that many Presbyterians a generation ago probably never could have imagined. The assembly had been scheduled to meet in Baltimore June 20-27, but the Committee on the Office of the General Assembly (COGA) decided formally in April that, because of the need for social distancing, that couldn't happen.

New business? This assembly will be much shorter than usual (with plenary sessions streamed online on June 19, 26 and 27) and the agenda will be abbreviated. COGA's recommendation is to include only business considered "critical and core," and to refer everything else to the General Assembly two years from now (although commissioners could try to alter that when the

docket comes up for a vote June 19, if they feel there's particular business – such as action on social justice – that just can't wait).

There's a lot on the list to be referred to the General Assembly in 2022 – including PC(USA) policy on climate change, gun violence, financial sustainability, racial injustice, international concerns and much more — and there's been pushback from some Presbyterian groups to add more business to the docket this year, although time will be tight.

Here's another possibility. Once the assembly convenes, a commissioner could move to suspend the rules to introduce new business. Such a motion would need a two-thirds vote to prevail — but if enough commissioners feel the PC(USA) needs to speak or act, to offer the assembly's public witness on the COVID-19 pandemic or George Floyd's killing or the systemic inequities driving the protests in the streets, that could happen.

Leadership. Much of the "critical and core" business on which the assembly will be asked to vote is not particularly controversial. It includes, for example, confirmation of the election of leaders of PC(USA) agencies and changes in standing rules.

The assembly also will make decisions about leadership, including deciding whether to elect J. Herbert Nelson for a second four-year term as the denomination's stated clerk – the public face and chief ecclesiastical officer of the PC(USA) – and choosing among three teams of candidates who are standing to serve as co-moderators of this assembly.

Money. The commissioners also will vote on budgets — budgets that reflect the financial pain of the PC(USA) and the struggles of small churches to survive. A COVID-19 Financial Team is projecting income declines across the denomination of about 25% in 2020 and 2021, and the budgets this assembly will be asked to approve have been scaled back from earlier proposals to reflect that.

The proposed General Assembly per capita rate is \$8.95 per member in both 2021 and 2022 — the same as it has been in 2019 and 2020. "An increase to the apportionment rate for 2021 is not politically, or economically, feasible," a report from the COVID-19 Financial Team states.

Worship and action. The assembly also will include a worship service on June 26 in which Nelson will speak theologically about lament, injustice and hope. Presbyterians are invited to participate online in a series of events — including the Poor People's Campaign Assembly & Moral March on Washington (being held digitally at 10 a.m. EDT June 20); a Youth Rising event featuring young entrepreneurs of color from Baltimore (at 3 p.m. EDT June 23); and Bible study led by James Elisha Taneti and Mary Florence Taneti, focusing on Lamentations 5:20-21 (in two identical 45-minute sessions, at 7 p.m. and 10 p.m. EDT June 24). The offering being taken during opening worship will go to support Youth Rising.

One benefit of a virtual General Assembly: Anyone with internet access can watch online, free of charge and without registering, either on the GA224 website or the Spirit of GA Facebook page. All business items coming to the assembly can be found at pc-biz.org.

The exact order of business during the June 26 and 27 plenaries is still to be determined, but here's the outline of the docket (see above, all times are EDT).

New ways. Among the unknowns are how well all this will work and what glitches – technological or otherwise – might emerge, such as how commissioners discern together if they've never met in person and can't spend those extra minutes gathered in small groups to get to know one another, talk through a complicated proposal or to pray together.

Some are mourning the lack of in-person connection and also that visceral sense an assembly provides of being part of a broader connectional church.

This may, however, be the start of a new practice for the PC(USA) — one that's certainly less expensive and perhaps more flexible. "We are talking about a major transformation in assemblies going forward," Nelson has said. And also: "I don't think we're ever going to be the same church again."

Holland-days...

Another week, another record. The global positive case count for the coronavirus increased by 915,000 humans during the past week. Fortunately the last seven days saw a modest decrease in the mortality rate as 'only' 30,000 lights were extinguished worldwide, 5,000 of which were in the US. As we conclude this year's ode to graduates, I am left to wonder if my own forgetfulness in donning a mask in all social situations counteracts any words of encouragement I might provide to future generations.

Dominion (Conclusion)

Recollections came in waves like the Black Sea chop Dorcas could feel rolling under the research vessel as it steamed toward Istanbul and the Bosporus. She thought back to her first job out of school at the desalinization plant in southern Florida. Fresh water was a serious issue back then and desalinization was still in its infancy; it was a hugely inefficient process. Fortunately, the company she worked for was conscientious and well-funded. She served on the team charged with finding a way to solve the waste problem, specifically what to do with the salt byproduct. Almost every other outfit dumped their salt back into the ocean, thereby making their next job tougher, not to mention altering the chemical balance of the local seawater. She smiled inwardly at the haphazard way they had stumbled upon the process for transforming the excess salt into the hydrogen-chloride tablets that now fueled half of the world's machinery. Was it luck? Dorcas preferred to think of it as providence. There was more of a mystic, karmic element to something that earth-shattering. Besides, pure dumb luck discounts all of the preparation, the sweat-equity that goes into reaching outside one's comfort zone.

And what of this notion called preparation? She wondered if she would have been in a position to have been a part of these scientific breakthroughs without the renewed emphasis on STEM in childhood education. She thought about the academic background of her colleagues on this boat. They represented every continent, every race, most every religion. Dorcas treasured their everyday interactions as much as she did the breathtaking research they performed on a daily basis. They all seemed to possess the curiosity and desire to change the world, and their knowledge base was unparalleled.

In these moments of reflection, of contemplation, Dorcas often thought back to the words the pastor at her small church had whispered to her when she was starting high school. They were the same words written above the scientists' galley door in Sanskrit, and it was also tattooed on her inner forearm, this ancient proverb: "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge; fools despise wisdom and instruction." Subconsciously she rubbed the inscription, and then by habit rubbed the tattoo on her other forearm, this one from the Sermon on the Mount: "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God."

Dorcas' train of thought was interrupted by the whistling of her tea pot. She nimbly turned the heat off and opened the drawer containing her dwindling supply of Sumatran leaves. She retraced her steps to the back alley market in Djakarta where she originally bought the two pound bag. A year later it barely held enough for two more cups. She made a mental note to buy some more if she ever found her way there again. Somehow she knew she would. ...The End
