No, Jody is the actual Chair and does a great job of keeping us on task with agendas and notes for each meeting. I'm not sure if I was chosen to report for the Team because a) I'm retired and usually around; b) some people think I'm Dr. Fauci; or c) no one else wanted to do it. Whichever, you've got me again this week!

You likely read about our in-person worship reopening criteria in last week's PresbEnews. Unfortunately, the current significantly increased number of Covid-19 cases in the county is a big hurdle for us to get past before considering reopening.

But, meanwhile, the PRT is working out the details of a reservation system for in-person worship that we hope folks will be able to do on-line or through calling Linda at the church office 586-9194 Monday 9am- 3pm or Tuesday-Thursday 9am-4pm.

As groups, like the Boy Scouts and PW Circles, are considering using the Fellowship Hall and Room 203/204, further details are being worked out with them, so they have a plan for things like masks, furniture arrangements to ensure distancing, food and beverage procedures, sanitizing surfaces and opening/closing the building. Our general Building Use Policy is being updated as well.

In some fun Rockhaven news......Sunday afternoon the church youth, in grades 6-12, and their families informally spent from 2-5 p.m. outdoors at Rockhaven. It's obviously great to have that outdoor space they can safely use!

If you're looking for a great way to stay connected, consider sticking around on Zoom after the church services during the 'coffee time' for a chance to talk with your church friends. Imagine it's the back of the sanctuary and everyone's hanging around to talk and enjoy a cookie and coffee. And, remember there are the excellent 11 a.m. Sunday morning Adult Sunday School Classes, the Thursday morning 10 a.m., and the Tuesday evening 7 p.m. Congregational Gatherings. 
Middle Grades



Holland-days...

The novel coronavirus continued to set notorious world records in its march through humankind last week. Globally, 2.127 million positive cases were reported during the past seven days, an increase of 86,000 over the previous week's short-lived record. Locally, Gallatin County recorded its worst week thus far with 215 cases, which was part of Montana's worst week that included Saturday's dismal news of 501 positive cases in a single day.

It was very easy to become discouraged during the past seven days. I reached my low point on Wednesday afternoon while I was refereeing a pair of junior high football games in Belgrade. I have mentioned previously in this space that I am somewhat obsessive about wearing a mask during contests, and I continued my strategy again on Wednesday. My campaign fell on deaf ears.

There were quite a few fans in the stands for the games and prior to each game the school's principal made an announcement requesting those in attendance to kindly wear their masks, since it was quite evident they were not socially distanced. They did not comply with the request. The very next day the Belgrade School District announced a hiatus for all athletic activity after three athletes tested positive which resulted in the quarantine of 165 students and fourteen coaches. The ripple effect has been fairly dramatic especially since most of the coaches are also teachers and now the district is not able to find enough substitute teachers to provide in-class instruction.

Unfortunately my anecdote is not the only instance of folks flaunting guidance. On Saturday the Helena Valley hosted the Let Freedom Ring concert. Its organizers worked with Lewis and Clark County health officials to establish safety protocols to protect attendees. All went according to plan — that is until nightfall when the sheriffs, reporters, and health officials left. It was then that the proverbial masks were ripped off, all guidelines were ignored, and the concertgoers celebrated their freedom from common sense as evidenced by social media posts of hundreds of maskless folks packed around the stage.

I realize I might sound like a broken record as I report all of this dismal COVID news, but it just seems like there is a significant segment of our society that prefers to wear their masks over their eyes and ears rather than their nose and mouth. Holland, you might be saying, take a chill pill. Go for a drive or something.

So on Monday I did.

Christine and I drove along Belt Creek between Great Falls and White Sulphur Springs on Monday afternoon, and let me assure you that God's creation is at its autumnal finest right now. The colors were so spectacular and distracting that we almost didn't see a black bear as it attempted to cross the road in front of us. Yeah, I guess I was a little more chill after that.
