Co-Pastors' Corner... December is here, the month in which we look forward to the

Christmas holidays. Most years, we do our best to remember the "reason for the season" amid commercialization, excess spending, and overindulgent partying. Most years, we are like the kids in "A Charlie Brown Christmas," often distracted from the purpose of the holiday. But this year the world is begging for "God with us." This year we know we all need to hear the message of the child born in a manger, a Savior for the world.

We will be telling that story with its message of hope, peace, joy, and love throughout the month of December in our Advent services each Sunday. In a usual December, this newsletter would announce the dates and times of all the special festivities—our Advent event and tree lighting, Christmas at Rockhaven, Handel's Messiah concert, Christmas Eve services, the Blessing of the Animals, and more. This year there are fewer events, but our church's leaders and staff are committed to making this a memorable and meaningful Christmas.

The Messiah will happen in a reinvented way. Thanks to Kathy Braun's initiative, recordings of previous years have been professionally remastered into a single recording. This will be paired with interviews of local musicians involved in its production, and the end result will be a podcast produced by Montana PBS and released on Sunday, December 20 for the whole community to hear. WOW! If you are not familiar with podcasts, this is an audio-only format which has become guite popular in recent years. Details are still being worked out, and will be published in the PresbEnews closer to the event.

Christmas Eve will happen, with children and youth at the center-in a reinvented way. It's so important for our kids to hear and tell the Christmas story, to keep this special time of year special. Our plan is developing, involving our youth and families. We will have a hybrid intergenerational service with lots of music and, of course, the Christmas story. Details are still being worked out, and will be published in the PresbEnews closer to the event.

Finally, the service on the Sunday after Christmas has become a beloved tradition, our Blessing of the Animals Sunday. To give the hard-working worship team a Sunday off, Dan Holland and Scott Thrasher have accepted the challenge of reinventing this service as an online event. They are already collecting photos of animals and their people-see the instructions on page 7. This is sure to be a creative and fun service, reminding us of the blessing which God's creatures are in our lives. How to connect? Details are still being worked out, and will be published in PresbEnews closer to the event.

This year will be different. But this year, we are certain the message of God's love will come through.

Session Notes November 19

Session met Thursday, Nov 19th via Zoom. The clerk's report and the minutes of the previous session meeting was approved.

The PRT Pandemic Response Team continues to meet twice a week and diligently analyzes the metrics and as of now, with the continuing surge of COVID, it is not safe to open for in-church services. PRT submitted a detailed report and session unanimously approved of their decisions and voted to support and affirm the priorities of public health, safeguarding our church staff and protecting the vulnerable as well as respecting those who work in the health care system. Online worship will be continued through 2021, concurrent with in-person services when the in-person services resume.

The stewardship campaign as of the meeting was about 56% of the way to the goal of \$355,000.

Reports from each committee were submitted and they all continue to meet and work on their goals.

Deacons Work Goes On

Despite the challenges of the Pandemic, the work of the Deacons goes on, including two of our usual projects this fall – Warm Clothing and Thanksgiving Baskets, which are focused on helping community members in need.

The Warm Clothing Project was headed up by Craig and Linda Miller with help from Joann and Roger Robbins. This year, 47 children from Monforton and Gallatin Gateway School each received two items, depending on what they requested. The children are identified by the counselors at the school as those in need of some assistance. The Bozeman School District Family Services Coordinator was also contacted; however, with the challenges of Covid, Bozeman Schools were not able to participate this year. Coats, snow pants and boots were purchased from Kohls, Target and Walmart. The children also received warm scarves or hats knitted by our very own Sally Broughton. Thank you Sally!

The Thanksgiving Baskets became gift cards this year, similar to what we did at Easter. Scott and Mary Thompson head up this project, and they filled 65 requests from Thrive, Monforton School, Gallatin Gateway School, and LOVE, Inc. Scott and Mary crossed checked the requests to make sure there were no duplicates. Each card has a value of \$60, which is about what the Deacons spent on groceries per food basket. The cards are from Town and Country Foods, and can be used at any one of their stores. These Town and Country cards do not allow purchase of alcohol or tobacco.

These projects and the work of the Deacons are supported by all of you - the congregation at First Presbyterian Church. We would not be able to accomplish efforts like these without your help.

Interfaith Forum December 2 at noon

Norman Huynh and Jon Harney speak at Interfaith Forum on Religion and Public Art

Bozeman Symphony's Music Director Norman Huynh and Symphonic Choir Director Jon Harney will be guests in the monthly Interfaith Forum on **Wednesday**, **December 2 at noon**. In this virtual forum, Huynh and Harney will join longtime panelists Father Leo Proxell of Holy Rosary Catholic Church, Rabbi Ed Stafman, rabbi emeritus of Congregation Beth Shalom, the Rev. Jody McDevitt of First Presbyterian Church, and Shadmani Amin of the Islamic Center of Bozeman, to address questions rising from the roots of art and music in particular religious traditions. Is there a line to be drawn in public presentations, given the diversity of our population today? And are there artists or musicians whose beliefs obscure the value of their work?

Following presentations by each of the panelists, there will be time for questions from the audience and further discussion by the panelists.

The Interfaith Forum is in its twelfth year of monthly meetings, providing the Gallatin Valley with insights into diverse topics of religious, social, and spiritual interest. Congregation Beth Shalom Hosts Interfaith Hanukkah on Zoom

Eight days of lighting candles, eating traditional foods, and telling the story of a miracle which saved the Hebrew people and their faith—that's the Hanukkah tradition. This year, Congregation Beth Shalom will adapt the Jewish traditions to an online format, devoting one of the eight evenings to an interfaith observance. Jody McDevitt is one of several community faith leaders who will join Rabbi Mark Kula in leading the service, and our congregation is invited to join in on **Tuesday evening**, **December 15, at 7 pm**.

Hanukkah, or the Festival of Lights, commemorates the rededication of the Second Temple in Jerusalem in the second century BCE. When Jewish practice was outlawed by the Syrian king Antiochus IV Ephiphanes and the Temple was defiled by the sacrifice of pigs and an altar dedicated to Zeus, a small army of Jews known as the Maccabees rebelled. They regained control of the Temple. There was only enough sacred oil to keep the Temple's menorah lit for one day. But miraculously, the oil burned for eight days.

Although Hanukkah is a minor holiday in Judaism, it has become an important holiday for American Jews, largely because of its proximity to Christmas. It provides a way for Jews to celebrate their distinctive heritage in the midst of commercialized Christmas. This year Hanukkah begins on December 10 and concludes on December 18. Watch for Zoom links closer to the event, and plan to join in.

This past Sunday marked the first week of the Advent season. During the worship service Lenka and Hans Swenson lit the candle of hope and read a poem by Howard Thurman entitled *I Will Light Candles This Christmas.* Thurman was an African-American pastor, theologian, and civil rights activist, whose bona fides include mentoring Martin Luther King Jr. in 1955 at Boston University where King received his PhD and Thurman served as Dean of the chapel.

Thurman's poem is the centerpiece of the PCUSA's Advent devotional this year and it provides great food for thought as we consider each of the four candles surrounding the Christ candle which forms the center of the Advent wreath. It is worth noting that Thurman was born in 1899, so he was a young man attending Morehouse College when the last great pandemic made its mark on this world.


Candles of hope where despair keeps watch

Last week ten thousand three hundred and ninety-six Americans lost their fight with COVID-19 and were handled by last responders. There are ten thousand and eighty minutes in a week. I'll let you do the math.

When we hear these grim statistics how are we to maintain any semblance of hope? When we see pictures of refrigerated trucks serving as temporary morgues in El Paso, when we read sixteen obituaries in the Great Falls paper in one day, how can we keep the light from flickering?

O sister, O brother, that is the beauty of Christ's light, it does not flicker, it does not fade. Christ's light is meant to be shone in the darkest corners of despair. Let us light candles.
