Co-Pastors' Corner... Some of the most meaningful discussions held in the

adult Sunday school class this year have been about the paradox that joy arises from focusing on others rather than on ourselves. When the class read *The Book of Joy*, we saw two self-sacrificing spiritual leaders of our day, Archbishop Desmond Tutu and the Dalai Lama, exhibiting joy from deep in their souls. They share a profound friendship which erupts in smiles and laughter even when they are talking about their experiences of persecution and oppression. Now we are studying the letter of Paul to the Philippians. Paul wrote this letter from prison, to people he loved but could not see, who were experiencing both opposition from society and internal conflict. Yet he repeatedly speaks of his joy and theirs, and enjoins them to "Rejoice in the Lord always!"

In this time of pandemic, it is easy to name our personal woes, struggles, grief, and anger. The sadness which is so prevalent in our world seems to be the enemy of joy. In dark moments, we may wonder how we will ever be happy again. But the wisest spiritual teachers tell us that the pursuit of personal happiness will not yield deep joy. We can spend a lot of money on stuff, entertainment, and experiences. We can seek popularity, influence, or security. But joy does not reside in these. Joy arrives when we live with compassion, generosity, and humility. Joy emerges when we give up our selves for God and for others, living in the love in which God made us.

Right now there is an opportunity for joy through giving to the most vulnerable members of our community. You can read more about the Housing First Village on page 4 of this edition of the Good News. Instead of turning aside from the problem of homelessness, hardening our hearts to the situation of people who have more problems than anyone else, we are working with others in our community to give long-term safe shelter and an opportunity to address their challenges. There will be opportunities to contribute volunteer labor later in the summer. Consider how you can turn your focus on others. Consider how to increase your compassion, generosity, and humility.

It is an invitation to live more like Christ, and discover his joy.

Benefits of getting the COVID-19 Vaccine:

Protect the Vulnerable – Children under 16 and people with weakened immune systems aren't able to get the vaccine. Help protect people who are at greater risk if they contract COVID - those with medical conditions (cancer, diabetes, heart, lung, or kidney disease), those who have intellectual disabilities, are 65 or older, pregnant, obese and people living in high-density housing.

Avoid Life-threatening Illness or long-term complications of COVID-19 such as Respiratory Failure, Pneumonia, Blood Clots, Injuries to Heart, Liver, Kidneys and Lungs, Septic Shock and Multisystem Inflammatory Syndrome.

Gain Access Vaccinated people gain better access to travel without testing and quarantines, access to visit hospitalized loved ones to manage their care, and can safely visit vaccinated people in private settings without wearing a mask.

Avoid Quarantine if Exposed - Vaccinated people don't have to stay home for 14 days if exposed to someone outside their household. Vaccinated don't have to be tested unless they have symptoms.

*We continue to "mask up" for these events because we are following the "2 out of 3 rule" for limiting Covid-19 risk. <u>Make sure your activity meets two out of the following three</u> <u>conditions: outdoors, distanced and masked</u>. We also will be singing, a high-risk activity, and not everyone will be vaccinated.

Session Notes April 22

PRT - The Pandemic Response Team recommended and Session approved the purchase of an \$800 Bose sound system/speaker used at Rockhaven for outdoor worship on Easter. The PRT has spent significant time in several meetings considering our church's requirements for Hybrid (In-Person and Online) worship and meetings. PRT asked Session to provide direction asking Session to consider: As we look toward the post-Covid future, what sorts of church activities and meetings do you envision could be facilitated by technology that allows some people to be in-person and others to be elsewhere? Understanding that cost/benefit choices need to be made, how many people in the room need to be accommodated. Session felt meetings (Deacons, Session, Committees) and Educational groups (Adult Sunday School, Presby Cats, Men's Bible Study, Presbyterian Women) were activities and meetings might be offered in a Hybrid format with the general consensus being that equipment should accommodate up to 16 people present in the meeting space, with others choosing to join remotely.

Dan reported that Kori Robbins, a former Presby Cat, whom our church is a sponsor in her seminary education, has expressed interest in becoming a military chaplain. Kori loved her time in Presby Cats and Dan noted the excitement that she would be ministering to young adults in the military who are of the same 18-26 year age group, possibly all over the world.

Following the cancellation, of the Presby Cat mission trip to Cuba due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, Delta Airlines refused to refund the plane tickets. The Cuba plane tickets could only be applied toward future travel. Upon the recommendation of Finance Committee Elder Debbie Ernst, Dan Holland, and Treasurer, Ric Tieman, Session voted to allow each Presby Cat, who paid \$550 toward their airline tickets, to utilize their plane tickets for future travel.

First Presbyterian Church to help fund the building of a tiny home in HRDC's Housing First Village

Thirteen households from FPC's Adult Sunday School Class have pledged \$9,600 to support chronically homeless people benefitting from the Housing First Village project. Session approved church fundraising for the project and authorized up to \$11,000 of our church's Endowment Spendable Mission fund to be used as matching funds of church member pledges. An anonymous church member will provide an additional \$11,000 as "dollar for dollar" matching funds generating a combined total a fundraising goal of \$44,000 (\$22,000 of matching funds).

Housing First Village is Underway!

At its April 22 meeting, the Session responded to an initiative from the Adult Sunday school and the Endowment Board of Trustees to open a fundraising campaign to support the Housing First Village of HRDC. With the generosity of the Sunday school class, the funds available from the Endowment, and a challenge grant of \$11,000, the goal at the time of the Session meeting was \$44,000. Since that meeting, an additional challenge grant of \$10,000 has also been offered.

So what is the Housing First Village? In short, it will be a neighborhood of 19 tiny homes built for the most vulnerable members of our community, with an adjacent social service resource hub.

Housing First Village aims to provide transformative housing to Bozeman's chronically homeless. Targeted towards the homeless population most at risk, this safe and sustainable model is designed to support successful reintegration into community living and permanent housing. The single-user "tiny" homes or shelters would provide a new way to address the growing issue of homelessness while maintaining the resident's autonomy and dignity.

This model is based on the "Housing First" philosophy, limiting the barriers to entry and providing supportive services to residents, including mental health and addiction support. Central to this model's success is a resource hub, which will include access to health resources, case management, and other support services. Each home will have a small kitchenette and bathroom for independent living.

Nineteen homes will be built in 2021 on the site on Wheat Drive in N. Bozeman. Seven of these are slated to be built with volunteer labor later in the summer.

On Monday afternoon I became the 305,031st Montanan to be fully immunized against the SARS-Covi-2 virus. I was also the 29,032nd Gallatinite to be likewise protected. I fear the next 300,000 jabs in Montana will be a much heavier lift, despite the fact that doses have never been more plentiful. Some of this vaccine hesitancy is from a fear of side effects. Unfortunately most of the reports of side effects come from younger folks and that is precisely the demographic that needs to be encouraged to participate. This has given rise to programs such as 'a shot and a beer' to entice younger generations to participate (for the record the only thing I got with my shot was a bandaid.)

The human psyche is a difficult mystery to unravel. For the most part the campaign to encourage vaccinations has thus far been positive reinforcement. Famous people have documented their own jabbings in order to socially influence the reluctant crowd. But what if this campaign takes a darker turn such as the PSAs we see fighting meth use and drunk driving? Would it have any affect to show those hesitant folks video of mass cremations in the streets of India? Or perhaps footage of beyond capacity ICUs in Milan, or New York, or Brazil, or Los Angeles? Instead of relying on personal responsibility to combat the pandemic, perhaps the focus should be placed on loving one's neighbors.

Although it seems as if this rapidly mutating spike protein has invaded every aspect of our lives, there are some things the virus cannot control like the weather. It has been quite some time since I fell asleep to the sound of gently falling rain as I did on Sunday night. This was a welcome serenade in more ways than one. March and April had been alarmingly dry (albeit cool) and we were already an inch and half below our normal moisture level for the year. This surprise nearly cut the deficit in half, and while we will continue to pray for more, it was still good to finally see worms wriggling on the pavement.

The other reason it was good to hear rain pattering upon the rooftop and water running out of the rainspouts was because of the assurance those sounds provide. We have no doubt heard the phrase "in these uncertain times" more than we can count during the past year. How marvelous it was, then, to lie in bed and hear nothing but the rain, to be reminded of our childhood, and to fall into a relaxed state of rest surrounded by the sound of God's abundance pouring over our lives.
