Pandemic Team Report by John Patterson

Greetings from your Pandemic Response Team! As everyone, we're pleased that the number of Gallatin County Covid-19 cases remain low – with a 7-day rolling average of 2.1 cases per 100,000. We'd like to think the PRT will soon be out of a job!

As you're aware, for our services we're continuing our masking and physical distancing requirements and are still refraining from congregational singing, but we've suspended the RSVP system and no longer feel the need to take attendance for contact tracing. In the Covid world, that's progress!

The PRT is discussing when can we feel confident to further loosen our current Covid and still protect the unvaccinated and those immunocompromised among us? What are the health metrics we should be looking at? Using schema from various health authorities our discussion will continue. If you have ideas or would like to be part of the decision making you are welcome to join us as we continue to meet by Zoom on Monday afternoons at 4 p.m.

Session will be meeting in person this Thursday for the first time since the beginning of the Pandemic shutdowns. A hybrid meeting is planned, utilizing a conference phone for audio and computers for video while we research further how to best have hybrid meetings. We're looking forward to seeing each other again. Speaking of technology, another step the church is taking is looking into replacing our old phone system with a new cloud-based system which would work well with the fiber optic connection we now have. It's part of our planning for the future.

The Youth Mission trip to the Crow reservation will be June 28-July 2 with 8 youth and 4 adults planning to go. We all know what spiritual growth experience youth mission trips are. But how can you have a mission trip while Covid is still active? Well, fortunately the CDC has provided summer camp advisories the group will be following. We pray that our team will have a healthy and meaningful experience and be a blessing to and be blessed by those they'll serve.

There are still a number of Rockhaven work projects you are all encouraged to help with at the Camp. If you have some free time and could clean some windows, do some painting or other things, simply contact Scott at Rockhaven (763-4242) or on his cell phone (600-1891) to see how you can help. You're also welcome and encouraged to drop in at Rockhaven through the week while the summer camps are in session to witness for yourselves the fantastic experience the kids have. Check in with Scott when you arrive so he knows you are there.

Holland-days...

One of the positive developments from the ongoing pandemic was the Tuesday night fellowship zoom gatherings. These informal meetings concluded a month or so ago, but during the year in which they were regularly held, they were a steady buoy in a turbulent ocean. The attendance at these meetings wasn't always enormous, but there were a few regulars as well as occasional attenders like myself. If there were fifty total gatherings, then I would guess I may have zoomed in fifteen times. I was always treated to great socializing, some fascinating stories, and Jody normally wrapped it all up with a poignant devotional. I regret not tuning in more often, and it was one of the times I did not that leads us to today's subject matter. I was tasked *in absentia* by a certain regular attender (let's call her MJ) with shining light on the remarkable story of a young student.

Rodney Aloise is the seventeen year old son of Holly Aloise, an elder and jack-of-all-trades staff member at the church. I have known Rodney for years, but I didn't really know him until we engaged in an hour long phone call last week that was as impressive as it was fascinating.

Rodney will be a senior at Bozeman High this fall, but he already has a life plan. For the past year-and-a-half he has been deeply involved in the Civil Air Patrol (or CAP.) Over the course of those eighteen months the CAP has transformed Rodney from a reticent teenager into a bold and confident young man.

The Civil Air Patrol is a governmental organization that is best understood as the auxiliary of the U.S. Air Force. The official mission statement of CAP reads as follows: Supporting America's communities with emergency response, diverse aviation and ground services, youth development, and promotion of air, space, and cyber power. Rodney has immersed himself in all of it and can wax poetic about it anywhere, anytime. In fact, if you are involved in an organization looking to engage a confident, young speaker to pontificate about a little known subject and demonstrate the optimism we should have about the next generation, then you should look no further than Rodney.

Rodney has long sought to pursue a career in emergency medical services (EMS) and plans to obtain an Associate's degree in paramedicine after graduating from high school. But it is through the auspices of CAP that his plans became more definitive and I will devote the balance of this week's space as well as the next to sharing Rodney's description of CAP.

The Civil Air Patrol came into existence before the USAF, as it was founded a week prior to Pearl Harbor as a part of the Army Air Patrol. There are three main aspects of CAP: emergency services, aerospace education, and the cadet program. Just like in the military CAP maintains a ranking system and all new participants start out as Cadet Airmen. Rodney has progressed through the ranks quickly and is now a Cadet Chief Master Sergeant. He also serves as Squadron First Sergeant as well as the Emergency Services NCO. The local squadron has 36 cadets and fifty total members (and more can be found out about it at gallatin.cap.gov.)

Next week we will take a deeper dive into the specifics of the three main departments of CAP, but I will leave you this week with one of the key words I heard Rodney speak, followership. Starting out at the lowest rank can be humbling, but it is also instructive. One must learn to follow before one can learn to lead. That sure sounds like something Jesus may have said, and just as Rodney has learned the art of followership in the CAP, he is also learning how to follow Jesus.
