Congregational Meeting June 19



Ted Williams' Brother to be Honored Posthumously



Robert Williams was serving in the Army Air Corps when he was killed in Bataan in the Philippines in World War II, just a few days before Bataan was surrendered to the Japanese in April 1942. For three years he was listed as Missing in Action; later his remains were buried in Rocky Ford, Colorado, with others of his family. Recent genealogical study by Ted's daughter Celinda revealed that Robert was entitled to several military awards, including the Bronze Star and the Purple Heart. This **Friday, June 10 at 2 pm**, Senator Steve Daines will present these awards to Ted as the next of kin. The ceremony will be held at the American Legion building on East Main in Bozeman, with refreshments following.

I finally made it down to Rockhaven last Saturday. Other than the Sunrise Service on Easter morning, it was my first time down to our camp this year. Saturday was the last big clean-up day before the start of our summer camping season, and there was a big turnout. Fifteen people showed up and all of us worked hard. At one point there were eight different pieces of machinery being operated simultaneously. Weed-whackers, brush trimmers, push mowers, and riding mowers were all singing their high-pitched hymns. Flowers were planted, cupboards were scrubbed, holes were filled, machinery was fixed, and I don't know if this grand, old lady at the base of Sheep Rock has ever looked as spectacular.

Of course some of that had to do with the time of year. It was a drop-dead gorgeous day. The bluest of bluebird days. The rains of May had worked their magic; everything was a verdant green. The majesty of the mountain set against a cloudless sky was breathtaking.

Rockhaven will get used this summer more than it ever has. More children will revel in her beauty than ever before. They will discover her nooks and crannies, cool off beside her creek, smell the flowers in her meadow, cross the bridge over her beautiful, beautiful river, pray beside her campfire. They will be drawn close to their Creator and their Creator will be in their midst.

After all of our chores were done on Saturday and most of the folks had headed home, I still had one task I wanted to get done. There is a stubborn patch of noxious knapweed on the east side of the river and it's always best to spray when no one is around. After tending to this tiny blemish on Rockhaven's otherwise stunning countenance, I walked back across the bridge. The river was mocha colored and turbulent with run-off. As I neared the west side, I saw the tired, old dorm that will soon be filled with campers.

At some point during the course of the next twenty years the dorm will be replaced with a multi-purpose building. It will be the centerpiece of the not yet finalized long range plan. But that is a long ways off, and in the meantime the old dorm will have to make do. As I crossed the bridge, though, I saw something I hadn't noticed before. The windows on the dorm shone nearly as clear as the cobalt sky above. Jim Mitchell had spent the day washing all the windows and now I was enjoying the fruits of his labor. The floor-to-ceiling glass around the dorm's front door perfectly mirrored the scene within its gaze. Reflected in the windows were the trees lining the river, the velvet hills behind them, a portion of Sheep Rock taking it all in, and above that, in the midst of the big, big sky, was the face of God giving me the slyest of winks.
