The idea began at the May session meeting, when McKinley Hall, 2015-16 youth elder, put forth her idea. "People of my age get the impression from the media that religion is about closed minds and discrimination. The idea snowballed, a small committee formed, and plans were coordinated with the Gallatin Valley Interfaith Association. A Timely Interfaith Bible Study in Our Community

One of the most frequent injunctions in the Holy Scriptures is "Do not fear." Isaiah (41:10a) continues "for I am with you, do not be afraid, for I am your God." Yet we are living in a challenging time of escalating fear – especially about the other. In the media the loudest "religious" voices, sadly, seem to be the most reactive, violent, and fear-filled.

As people-of-the-Book, we are challenged, "What does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8, b) What timeless truths might the sacred Word have for us today? Presenters, Rabbi Ed Stafman, of Congregation Beth Shalom, and Pastor Stephen Schmidt, of Hope Lutheran Church, are offering an *Interfaith Bible Study* focused on Exodus 1-15, the Book of Ruth, and Matthew 2, titled:

Fleeing Oppression:

The Story of the Israelites, Ruth, Baby Jesus' family, & the Refugee

Bringing Jewish and Christian scholarship, as well as their faith perspectives, to this interfaith study, Rabbi Ed and Pr. Stephen, will examine passages and themes, pose questions, and reflect on an ancient truths for contemporary times. Facilitated by the Rev. Valerie Webster, President of MAC (2016) and an Associate at All Saints in Big Sky, **Fleeing Oppression** will include presentations on focus passages, discussion questions, and additional resources.

Holland-days...

On March 24, 2013 the Community Café served its first meal to the public here in Bozeman. Since that day, this brainchild of the HRDC based in the former Frontier Pie location on North Seventh, has provided a nutritious meal to anyone walking through its doors regardless of their ability to pay for that meal.

I have never owned a restaurant, but I have been involved enough with them over the years to know that the two biggest expenses for a food service enterprise are food cost and labor cost. The beauty of the Community Café model is that much of their food comes from the Food Bank and much of their labor comes from volunteer organizations. From the outset, First Presbyterian has been a part of that volunteer labor. On the second Monday of every month we have provided the Café with a crew of at least seven people to plate the food, and serve the diners, and bus the tables, and wash the dishes. The average work shift is about three hours, so at minimum wage we are subsidizing this effort to the tune of about \$170.00 per night. During the course of a month this works out to just over \$5,000 of labor provided by the community.

It is probably somewhat crass to boil down such a noble endeavor to mere dollars and cents, but these are some of the details the HRDC has had to examine of late as they have recently announced a major change to their service model. Beginning in September the Café will no longer be open on Saturdays in an effort to contain its cost overruns. By my reckoning that will end a streak of having served meals for 1,258 consecutive days. At an average of seventy-five people served each evening, that translates to over 94,000 full bellies. Chew on that for a second.

Last week, during our regularly scheduled second Monday, volunteers from our church served 103 people and it seemed like they all came during the first half hour. We were overwhelmed for a while, and I can honestly say I was exhausted after working my shift. Of the forty-one months our church has provided a work crew I suspect I have worked at least half of them, and I always enjoy it. I walk away each evening with a feeling of immense satisfaction. This feeling is less a sense of my own accomplishment and much more a sense of wonder at what a community is able to do when it sets its mind toward a worthwhile purpose.

The Community Café is a decidedly secular affair. Presbyterians serving atheists, and atheists serving Presbyterians. No questions are asked in the same manner that nothing is ever charged for the meal. But I have to think that Jesus is ever present. It's the kind of place where he would be a regular.
